ACCOUNTABILITY

SB-3 (Caballero) - Education finance: local control and accountability plan portal.

Requires the California Department of Education, on or before July 1, 2023, to develop a local control and accountability plan (LCAP) portal that contains a database connected to a data entry tool that allows comprehensive analysis of LCAPs adopted by local educational agencies.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-692 (Cortese) - Local control and accountability plans: state priorities: least restrictive environment.

Requires the California Department of Education to publish data related to federal measures of least restrictive environment (LRE) for pupils with disabilities on its internet website and include it as a resource on the California School Dashboard.

Status: Chapter 919, Statutes of 2022

SB-997 (Pan) - Local control and accountability plans: parent advisory committee: student advisory committee.

Requires school districts serving middle or high school students and county offices of education, by July 1, 2024, to either include two students on an existing parent advisory committee or establish a student advisory committee for purposes of developing and adopting the Local Control and Accountability Plan.

Status: Chapter 922, Statutes of 2022

AB-599 (Jones-Sawyer) - Public schools: accountability: county superintendents of schools.

Updates the criteria used to identify schools for inspection by a county superintendent of schools for purposes of the Williams settlement regarding the sufficiency of instructional materials and school facilities.

Status: Chapter 667, Statutes of 2021

AB-1868 (Luz Rivas) - School accountability: English language acquisition status: data.

Requires the California Department of Education to annually report on its website specified data on English learners, including enrollment data by English language acquisition status and disability and specified student performance and outcome data by English language acquisition status.

Status: Chapter 907, Statutes of 2022

AB-2121 (Eduardo Garcia) - School accountability: California Collaborative for Educational Excellence: special education resource leads.

Establishes a special education resource lead project to provide training and technical assistance on family support and alternative dispute resolution (ADR) in special education.

Status: Assembly-Died

ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION

SB-425 (Archuleta) - Opportunity schools.

Replaces the existing definition of opportunity schools with the existing definition of alternative schools or alternative schools serving high-risk pupils, codifies the existing high-risk pupil groups that alternative schools of choice must serve to be eligible for the Dashboard Alternative School Status (DASS) program, and authorizes opportunity schools, as newly defined, to establish various partnerships and utilize independent study. The bill was not heard by this committee at the author's request.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

SB-593 (Glazer) - Nonclassroom-based charter schools: audit requirements.

Requires the County Office Fiscal Crisis and Management Assistance Team (FCMAT) to offer auditors of non-classroom based charter schools specified training, requires the governing board of a charter school to review the annual audit of the charter school for the prior fiscal year, requires all independent study to be under the general supervision of an employee of the local educational agency, and requires all LEAs to only enter into an agreement for the provision or arrangement of educational enrichment activities with a vendor that is vetted and approved pursuant to prescribed criteria.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

ATTENDANCE AND TRUANCY

SB-955 (Leyva) - Pupil attendance: excused absences: civic or political events.

Permits students in grades 6 – 12 to have one excused absence per year to participate in a civic or political event provided that the pupil notifies the school ahead of the absence.

Status: Chapter 921, Statutes of 2022

AB-516 (Megan Dahle) - Pupil attendance: excused absences: cultural ceremonies or events.

Adds “for the purpose of participating in a cultural ceremony or event” to the list of categories of excused absences for purposes of school attendance.

Status: Chapter 281, Statutes of 2021

CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION

SB-673 (Portantino) - Adult Education Block Grant Program: reporting requirements.

Requires the Chancellor of the Community Colleges and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to convene a task force to review the reporting requirements of the Adult Education Program and develop any findings and recommendations. The bill was subsequently amended to relate to special education.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

AB-643 (Ramos) - Apprenticeship programs: career fairs.

Requires local educational agencies planning to hold a college or career fair to notify each apprenticeship program in the same county.

Status: Chapter 324, Statutes of 2021

AB-815 (Luz Rivas) - School nurses: credentialing.

Authorizes the Commission on Teacher Credentialing to approve a school nurse credentialing program offered by a local educational agency which had at least 40,000 student enrolled during the 2019-20 school year.

Status: Chapter 668, Statutes of 2021

AB-1923 (Mathis) - Partnership academies: science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM).

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to prioritize proposals for new California Partnership Academies based on a school district’s enrollment of socioeconomically disadvantaged pupils, as specified, and for school districts located in a rural or economically disadvantaged area.

Status: Chapter 114, Statutes of 2022

AB-2044 (O'Donnell) - Graduation requirements: career technical education.

Extends the sunset on the option for students to fulfill a state high school graduation requirement by successfully completing a Career Technical Education (CTE) course, until July 1, 2027. This bill was abosored into the 2022-23 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-2058 (O'Donnell) - Career technical education: California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Program: Strong Workforce Program.

Increases ongoing funding for the Career Technical Education (CTE) Incentive Grant program (CTEIG) to \$450 million per year, requires specified CTE staffing at the state and regional level to support local CTE programs and pathways, and subsumes the K-12 Strong Workforce Program (SWP) within the CTEIG.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

CHARTER SCHOOLS SCHOOL CHOICE AND TRANSFERS

SB-425 (Archuleta) - Opportunity schools.

Replaces the existing definition of opportunity schools with the existing definition of alternative schools or alternative schools serving high-risk pupils, codifies the existing high-risk pupil groups that alternative schools of choice must serve to be eligible for the Dashboard Alternative School Status (DASS) program, and authorizes opportunity schools, as newly defined, to establish various partnerships and utilize independent study. The bill was not heard by this committee at the author's request.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

SB-593 (Glazer) - Nonclassroom-based charter schools: audit requirements.

Requires the County Office Fiscal Crisis and Management Assistance Team (FCMAT) to offer auditors of non-classroom based charter schools specified training, requires the governing board of a charter school to review the annual audit of the charter school for the prior fiscal year, requires all independent study to be under the general supervision of an employee of the local educational agency, and requires all LEAs to only enter into an agreement for the provision or arrangement of educational enrichment activities with a vendor that is vetted and approved pursuant to prescribed criteria.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-1343 (Leyva) - Public employees' retirement: charter schools.

Requires a charter school newly authorized on or after January 1, 2023, to participate in CalSTRS or CalPERS, or both.

Status: Assembly-Died

AB-2484 (Mia Bonta) - Charter schools: school closures: remaining assets: Charter School Facility Grant Program.

Changes to the program requirements of the Charter School Facility Grant program (CSFGP) when the facilities used by charter schools are owned by related parties, and changes the procedures for any remaining net assets after a charter school closes.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

COVID LEARNING RECOVERY

SB-229 (Dahle) - Pupil health: mental health services: grants.

Requires the California Department of Education, contingent upon an appropriation, to provide up to \$500 million in grants each year for the exclusive purpose of providing mental health services for pupils affected by school closures and distance learning requirements resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-488 (Rubio) - Teacher credentialing: reading instruction.

Requires the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) to ensure, by July 1, 2025, that an approved teaching performance assessment (TPA) for a preliminary multiple subject credential and a preliminary education specialist credential assesses all candidates for competence in instruction in literacy, revises the definition of literacy instruction for purposes of teacher preparation and requires the CTC to ensure that its standards for program quality and effectiveness align to this definition, and provides an alternate means of meeting the current reading instruction competence assessment (RICA) for some credential candidates affected by COVID-19 test center closures.

Status: Chapter 678, Statutes of 2021

SB-545 (Wilk) - Pupil retention: COVID-19 impact.

Requires school districts to offer specific interventions and supports upon request by a parent to retain their student in the same grade level for the 2021-22 school year.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-723 (Rubio) - Pupil instruction: tutoring program: learning loss mitigation.

Establishes the California Leadership, Excellence, Academic, Diversity, and Service-Learning (LEADS) Tutoring Program to assist students in grades K-8 that have been affected by learning losses caused by school closures due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-1479 (Pan) - COVID-19 testing in schools: COVID-19 testing plans.

(1) Requires the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) to coordinate COVID-19 testing programs in local educational agencies (LEAs) funded by federal resources or organized under the California COVID-19 Testing Task Force; (2) permits CDPH to provide supportive services, as specified, related to LEA testing plans and testing programs for teachers, staff, pupils, and surrounding communities that help LEAs reopen and operate safely for in-person learning; and (3) requires schools to create a COVID-19 testing plan consistent with CDPH guidance, as specified.

Status: Chapter 850, Statutes of 2022

AB-126 (Eduardo Garcia) - Special education programs: Family Empowerment Centers on Disability.

Requires the establishment of additional Family Empowerment Centers on Disability (FECs), establishes increased funding levels awarded to each FEC, establishes new requirements for data collection and reporting to the California Department of Education (CDE), and requires the CDE to \$20 million in one-time funding to FECs and other organizations to support families of students with disabilities whose education has been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The bill was not heard by this committee at the author's request.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-856 (Maienschein) - Pupil health: COVID-19 Youth Health Information Act.

Establishes the COVID-19 Youth Health Information Act and requires the California Department of Education to: (1) post on its internet website information related to the safe return of pupils to exercise and physical activity after exhibiting signs or symptoms of, or testing positive for, COVID-19; (2) monitor the best practices and evolving guidelines on the safe return of pupils; and (3) encourage schools and school districts to give pupils and their parents and guardians ready access to this information.

Status: Chapter 123, Statutes of 2021

AB-967 (Frazier) - Special education: COVID-19 Special Education Fund.

Establishes the COVID-19 Special Education Fund, for purposes of providing matching funds, on a one-to-one basis, to support local educational agencies in conducting activities to prevent and intervene early in conflicts, conduct voluntary alternative dispute resolution, and provide services to pupils with disabilities relating to impacts to learning associated with COVID-19 school disruptions.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-1113 (Medina) - Public postsecondary education: exemption from tuition and fees: qualifying survivors of persons providing medical or emergency services deceased during COVID-19 California state of emergency.

Exempts from mandatory systemwide or campus-based tuition or fees at the University of California, California State University, and California Community College any surviving spouse or child, of a licensed physician or a licensed nurse employed by a health facility regulated and licensed by the California Department of Public Health or as a first responder employed to provide emergency services who died of COVID.

Status: Chapter 569, Statutes of 2021

DUAL ENROLLMENT

SB-1299 (Min) - Pupil instruction: California State Summer School for Mathematics and Science: funding: tuition and application fee.

Extends by five years existing law related to tuition and financial aid for the California State Summer School for Mathematics and Science (COSMOS), operated by the University of California, from January 1, 2023, to January 1, 2028.

Status: Chapter 334, Statutes of 2022

AB-102 (Holden) - Pupil attendance at community colleges: College and Career Access Pathways partnerships: county offices of education.

Allows county offices of education and adult education programs to enter into College and Career Access Pathways (CCAP) partnerships with community college districts and removes the sunset date and special admit cap for the CCAP program.

Status: Chapter 902, Statutes of 2022

AB-2617 (Holden) - Pupil instruction: dual enrollment programs: competitive grants: College and Career Access Pathways partnerships: best practices: communication and marketing strategy.

Establishes a grant program administered by the California Department of Education to increase participation in dual enrollment programs at designated local education agencies.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION PRESCHOOL TK KINDERGARTEN

SB-50 (Limón) - Early learning and care.

Expands the range of types of child care and early learning services that a State Preschool contracting agency may provide.

Status: Senate-Vetoed

SB-70 (Rubio) - Elementary education: kindergarten.

Requires, beginning with the 2024-25 school year, a student to have completed one year of kindergarten before being admitted to the first grade of a public school. This bill, therefore, expands compulsory education to include kindergarten.

Status: Senate-In Floor Process

SB-246 (Leyva) - Early childhood education: reimbursement rates.

Requires the California Department of Social Services to establish a single reimbursement rate for early learning and care programs, including variation for regional costs and quality adjustment factors.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-393 (Hurtado) - Migrant Childcare and Development Programs.

Aligns the funding structure for the migrant childcare alternative payment program (voucher) with other voucher programs by shifting the reimbursement rate for migrant childcare alternative payment programs from the Standard Reimbursement Rate to the Regional Market Rate. This bill also expands reimbursement allowances to include additional costs.

Status: Chapter 499, Statutes of 2021

SB-725 (Ochoa Bogh) - Early childhood education: parent participation preschool programs.

Establishes the Parent Participation Preschool Pilot Program, to be administered by the California Department of Education, to provide grants to State Preschool programs for the creation or expansion of parent participation preschool programs.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-976 (Leyva) - Universal Preschool Act.

Establishes, subject to an appropriation, a free universal system of preschool by expanding access to the State Preschool Program to all three- and four-year old children, regardless of family income, and expands the types of child care providers who may be eligible to offer state preschool.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-1047 (Limón) - Early learning and care.

Expands, from 12 months to 24 months, the period of a family's eligibility after establishing initial eligibility for state preschool and subsidized child care and development programs, and expands priority for eligibility, enrollment, and services to include families who receive specified human services benefits.

Status: Chapter 923, Statutes of 2022

SB-1183 (Grove) - The California State Library: Statewide Imagination Library Program.

Establishes the Statewide Imagination Library Program, administered by the State Librarian, to provide age-appropriate books to children age birth through age five who are registered for the program, sent to the child's home on a monthly basis at no cost to families, through Dolly Parton's Imagination Library.

Status: Chapter 992, Statutes of 2022

SB-1289 (Ochoa Bogh) - Private recreation programs: licensing exemption.

Extends an exemption from child care licensing to private recreation programs that provide programming for limited hours per week to young children not yet enrolled in

school, or to K-12 students outside of normal school hours. Further requires persons working for or volunteering with the private recreation program to be at least 18 years old and comply with applicable fingerprinting and criminal record requirements.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-1481 (Becker) - Preschools, child daycare facilities, and Trustline providers: meals.

Establishes, subject to an appropriation, a free, universal meal program through the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) by increasing state reimbursement to the existing federal meal program for children in the California State Preschool Program, general child care, and specified licensed-exempt care. Expands eligibility for free meals in these programs and creates a grant program to encourage expansion and participation in the CACFP in underserved communities.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

AB-22 (McCarty) - California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System: data collection.

Requires the California Department of Education to collect specified student-level data relative to enrollment in California state preschool programs operated by local educational agencies to provide longitudinal data. Prior versions of the bill would have expanded eligibility for enrollment in transitional kindergarten to younger four-year olds, adding one month of eligibility each year over a nine year period to eventually make all four-year olds eligible (transitional kindergarten expansion was included in the 2021 Budget).

Status: Chapter 901, Statutes of 2022

AB-92 (Reyes) - Preschool and childcare and development services: family fees.

Prohibits, subject to an appropriation, (1) family fees for state preschool and child care services from exceeding one percent of a family's monthly income; and (2) family fees from being charged to a family with an adjusted monthly family income below 75 percent of the state median family income.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-321 (Valladares) - Childcare services: enrollment priority.

Adds children with a primary home language other than English to priority enrollment in state preschool and federal or state subsidized general child care programs.

Status: Chapter 903, Statutes of 2022

AB-865 (Quirk-Silva) - Childcare services: alternative payment programs: direct deposits: reserve funds.

(1) Requires alternative payment programs (APPs) to reimburse childcare providers based on the maximum certified hours of need, rather than actual hours of care provided, and (2) increases the percentage of funds APPs may retain as reserves.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-1294 (Quirk) - Childcare: individualized county childcare subsidy plans.

Extends the authority for the individualized county child care pilot program for the County of Santa Clara to continue by one year, from July 1, 2022, to July 1, 2023.

Status: Chapter 497, Statutes of 2021

AB-1363 (Luz Rivas) - Childcare: dual language learners.

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) to develop procedures for State Preschool contractors to identify and report data on dual language learners, and requires the SPI to develop implementation procedures and related guidance for contractors.

Status: Chapter 498, Statutes of 2021

AB-1973 (McCarty) - Education finance: base grants: adjustments: kindergarten: minimum schoolday.

Phases in a requirement for school districts and charter schools offering a kindergarten program to offer at least one full-day kindergarten class at each schoolsite, as specified.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-2042 (Villapudua) - Child daycare facilities: anaphylactic policy.

Requires the California Department of Social Services to establish an anaphylactic policy that sets guidelines and procedures to be followed by child daycare personnel to prevent a child from suffering from anaphylaxis and to be used during a medical emergency by July 1, 2024.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-2806 (Blanca Rubio) - Childcare and developmental services: preschool: expulsion and suspension: mental health services: reimbursement rates.

Expands the existing prohibition on expelling children from state preschool programs to also prohibit the suspension of children enrolled in state preschool programs, and extends the prohibition on suspension and expulsion of children to include those enrolled in child care programs, with exception.

Status: Chapter 915, Statutes of 2022

AB-2827 (Quirk-Silva) - Child daycare facilities.

Requires the California Department of Social Services (CDSS), on or before January 1, 2024, to revise its regulations to permit children with exceptional needs who are enrolled in separate programs or classrooms from nondisabled children to use outdoor play spaces simultaneously with nondisabled children without first seeking a waiver, as specified, and requires CDSS to provide any health and safety requirements that must be met to do so, as specified.

Status: Chapter 916, Statutes of 2022

AB-2832 (Robert Rivas) - Whole Child Community Equity.

Establishes the End Racial and Economic Inequities in Childcare in California Initiative and further requires the California Department of Social Services (CDSS), in consultation with the California Department of Education, to develop the Whole Child Equity Framework and Whole Child Community Equity Screening Tool, and to finalize and present the Framework, Equity Tool and their recommended uses to the Legislature by January 1, 2025. This bill also requires CDSS to convene a stakeholder workgroup to provide recommendations for the development of the Framework and the Equity Tool.

Status: Chapter 699, Statutes of 2022

ENGLISH LEARNERS MIGRANT AND INDIAN EDUCATION

SB-705 (Hueso) - Workforce development: Binational Education and Workforce Opportunities Act.

Requires the California Department of Education and the California Workforce Development Board, in consultation with the California-Mexico Border Relations Council, to jointly form a study group of subject matter experts in specified fields to analyze unique challenges and opportunities arising from the presence of a large binational student population and workforce on both sides of the California-Mexico border.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-952 (Limón) - Pupil instruction: dual language programs: Expanding Culture and Language Learning in Schools Grant Program.

Revises and recasts an existing three-year competitive dual language grant program administered by the California Department of Education for schools. Existing law makes the implementation of the program contingent upon an appropriation.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

AB-1363 (Luz Rivas) - Childcare: dual language learners.

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) to develop procedures for State Preschool contractors to identify and report data on dual language learners, and

requires the SPI to develop implementation procedures and related guidance for contractors.

Status: Chapter 498, Statutes of 2021

AB-1703 (Ramos) - California Indian Education Act: California Indian Education Task Forces.

Establishes the California Indian Education Act and encourages local educational agencies to form California Indian Education Task Forces with California Indian tribes local to their respective regions for purposes of discussing issues of mutual concern and to undertake certain work.

Status: Chapter 477, Statutes of 2022

AB-1777 (Aguiar-Curry) - Migrant education: extended school year program: average daily attendance.

Allows up to two local educational agencies to receive funding for average daily attendance to provide an extended school year to serve pupils of migrant agricultural workers, commencing on January 1, 2024.

Status: Chapter 483, Statutes of 2022

AB-1868 (Luz Rivas) - School accountability: English language acquisition status: data.

Requires the California Department of Education to annually report on its website specified data on English learners, including enrollment data by English language acquisition status and disability and specified student performance and outcome data by English language acquisition status.

Status: Chapter 907, Statutes of 2022

EXPANDED LEARNING

AB-1112 (Carrillo) - Before and after school programs: cost study and advisory group.

Requires the California Department of Education, on or before October 1, 2022, to conduct a statewide cost study, utilizing an expanded learning stakeholder group, to determine adequate funding levels for expanded learning programs and make associated recommendations, and appropriates \$600,000 for these purposes.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2501 (Carrillo) - Before and after school programs: California Universal Afterschool Program Workgroup.

Establishes the California Universal Afterschool Program Workgroup within the California Department of Education to develop recommendations to develop a roadmap for providing universal access to afterschool programs for all school-age children.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2507 (McCarty) - The Universal Afterschool and Expanded Learning Opportunities Program: the After School Education and Safety Program: the 21st Century Community Learning Centers Program.

Creates new set-asides for the disbursement of After School Education and Safety Program (ASES) and 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) competitive grants, establishes a cost-of-living adjustment for ASES, and requires that the provisions be operative only if the Legislature appropriates at least \$5 billion in a fiscal year to fund the Universal Afterschool Program and Expanded Learning Opportunities Program.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

FACILITIES

SB-22 (Glazer) - Education finance: school facilities: Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act of 2022.

Makes changes to the existing School Facility Program and places the Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act on the ballot for statewide elections in 2022.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-616 (Rubio) - School facilities: proceeds from lease of surplus property: affordable rental housing facilities.

Specifies that a school district may use the proceeds from a lease of surplus property for one-time capital outlay costs and property maintenance costs if the proceeds from the lease will be used to construct new affordable rental housing facilities for school district employees. The bill was subsequently amended to relate to child abuse and safety.

Status: Senate-Died

SB-1144 (Wiener) - Water efficiency and quality assessment reports: state buildings and public school buildings.

Requires state agencies and public schools to complete a water efficiency and quality assessment report on their facilities, as specified. Requires the operating agency, if the

report identifies noncompliant plumbing fixtures and appliances or contaminants, to remedy the problem at the earliest practical time, subject to dedicated funding.

Status: Senate-In Floor Process

SB-1255 (Portantino) - Single-use products waste reduction: Dishwasher Grant Program for Waste Reduction in K–12 Schools and Community Colleges.

Establishes the Dishwasher Grant Program for Waste Reduction in K–12 Schools, to be administered by the California Department of Education, to provide grants to school districts and charter schools, for the purchase and installation of commercial dishwashers at schoolsites.

Status: Senate-In Floor Process

AB-75 (O'Donnell) - Education finance: school facilities: Kindergarten-Community Colleges Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2022.

Places the Kindergarten-Community Colleges Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2022 on the 2022 statewide ballot, to be operative only if approved by voters at the election. The bill was not heard by this committee at the author's request.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-306 (O'Donnell) - School districts and community college districts: employee housing.

Exempts school and community college district employee housing architectural plans from the requirement to receive approval from the Department of General Services' Division of State Architect.

Status: Chapter 49, Statutes of 2021

AB-544 (O'Donnell) - School property: location and facility details.

Requires local educational agencies (LEA) to provide the California Department of Education information related to each school facility, schoolsite, or school property owned or leased by the LEA.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-762 (Lee) - Hazardous emissions and substances: schoolsites: private and charter schools.

Requires charter schools and private schools to follow the same siting requirements as traditional public schools for evaluating schoolsites for potential hazardous substances, emissions, or waste.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-846 (Low) - Local Agency Public Construction Act: job order contracting.

Extends the existing authority for school and community college districts to administer job order contracting (JOC), an alternative construction contracting agreement, until January 1, 2027.

Status: Chapter 303, Statutes of 2021

AB-902 (O'Donnell) - School facilities: alternative design-build contracts.

Establishes an alternative design-build pilot project for the procurement of school construction contracts.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1867 (Lee) - School facilities: modernization projects: bathrooms.

Requires the governing board of a local educational agency intending to seek state funding for specified school modernization projects to include, as part of the project, faucet aerators and water-conserving plumbing fixtures in all bathrooms.

Status: Chapter 434, Statutes of 2022

AB-2214 (Cristina Garcia) - California Environmental Quality Act: schoolsites: acquisition of property: school districts, charter schools, and private schools.

Requires charter schools and private schools to comply with the same siting requirements as public schools for evaluating a schoolsite for potential hazardous substances, emissions, and waste.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2232 (McCarty) - School facilities: heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems.

Requires a school district, county office of education, charter school, private school, the California Community Colleges, the California State University, and requests the University of California, to ensure that facilities, including classrooms for students, have heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems that meet minimum ventilation rate requirements, as specified, and to install filtration that achieves minimum efficiency reporting values (MERV) levels of 13 or higher.

Status: Chapter 777, Statutes of 2022

AB-2484 (Mia Bonta) - Charter schools: school closures: remaining assets: Charter School Facility Grant Program.

Changes to the program requirements of the Charter School Facility Grant program (CSFGP) when the facilities used by charter schools are owned by related parties, and changes the procedures for any remaining net assets after a charter school closes.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2638 (Bloom) - School facilities: drinking water: water bottle filling stations.

Requires new construction or modernization projects submitted to the Division of State Architect by a school district or governing body of a charter school includes one or more water bottle filling stations.

Status: Chapter 793, Statutes of 2022

FOSTER AND HOMELESS YOUTH

SB-400 (Jones) - Homeless children and youths: local educational agencies: collaboration, training, and reporting.

Requires, pursuant to federal law, local educational agency liaisons for homeless youth to ensure the identification of homeless youth through outreach and coordination activities, and ensure homeless youth receive referrals for health and other services.

Status: Chapter 400, Statutes of 2021

SB-532 (Caballero) - Pupil instruction: high school coursework and graduation requirements: exemptions.

(1) Expands and strengthens the rights for foster youth, homeless youth, former juvenile court school students, children of military families, and migrant children to be exempted from local graduation requirements if certain conditions are met; (2) requires local educational agencies (LEAs) to provide those students the option to remain in school for a fifth year to complete the statewide coursework requirements if certain conditions are met; and (3) requires LEAs to annually report to the California Department of Education the number of students that graduate with an exemption from the LEA's local graduation requirements.

Status: Chapter 918, Statutes of 2022

SB-1341 (Cortese) - Homeless pupils: California Success, Opportunity, and Academic Resilience (SOAR) Guaranteed Income Program.

Establishes the California Success, Opportunity, and Academic Resilience Guaranteed (SOAR) Income Program to provide monthly payments for four months to homeless pupils in grade 12.

Status: Assembly-Died - Higher Education

AB-27 (Luz Rivas) - Homeless children and youths and unaccompanied youths: reporting.

Requires local educational agencies to administer a housing questionnaire to identify students who are homeless, and annually report to the California Department of Education the number of students who are homeless.

Status: Chapter 394, Statutes of 2021

AB-408 (Quirk-Silva) - Homeless children and youths: reporting.

Requires local educational agencies to establish homeless education program policies, requires homeless education liaisons to offer training to specified school staff, and requires the California Department of Education to develop a risk-based monitoring plan for homeless education requirements.

Status: Chapter 904, Statutes of 2022

AB-740 (McCarty) - Foster youth: suspension and expulsion.

Requires a local education agency (LEA) to send a notification to the foster child's attorney, county social worker, and educational rights, or tribal social worker, if that child is an Indian child as specified in Welfare and Institutions Code when an involuntary transfer to a continuation school, suspension, or expulsion proceeding occurs.

Status: Chapter 400, Statutes of 2022

AB-1055 (Ramos) - Foster youth: tribal pupils.

Modifies the definition of "students in foster care" to eliminate the requirement that a dependent child of the court of an Indian tribe also meet the definition of a dependent child of a county court, and to include a child of an Indian tribe who is the subject of a voluntary placement agreement.

Status: Chapter 287, Statutes of 2021

AB-2375 (Luz Rivas) - Homeless children and youths and unaccompanied youths: housing questionnaire.

Requires all local educational agencies to identify all homeless children and youth and unaccompanied youth enrolled at the school by administering a housing questionnaire based on specified best practices.

Status: Chapter 912, Statutes of 2022

HEALTH AND NUTRITION

SB-14 (Portantino) - Pupil health: school employee and pupil training: excused absences: youth behavioral health.

(1) Includes, specifically, "for the benefit of the behavioral health of the pupil" within the "illness" category for excused absences for purposes of school attendance; and (2)

requires the California Department of Education to identify an evidence-based and evidence-informed training program for local educational agencies to address youth behavioral health, including staff and pupil training.

Status: Chapter 672, Statutes of 2021

SB-97 (Roth) - Pupil health: type 1 diabetes information: parent notification.

Requires the California Department of Education to develop type 1 diabetes (T1D) informational materials for the parents and guardians of pupils, and requires school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools to make those informational materials accessible to the parents and guardians of pupils on and after January 1, 2023.

Status: Chapter 674, Statutes of 2021

SB-224 (Portantino) - Pupil instruction: mental health education.

Requires schools that offer one or more courses in health education to pupils in middle school or high school to include in those courses instruction in mental health, as specified.

Status: Chapter 675, Statutes of 2021

SB-229 (Dahle) - Pupil health: mental health services: grants.

Requires the California Department of Education, contingent upon an appropriation, to provide up to \$500 million in grants each year for the exclusive purpose of providing mental health services for pupils affected by school closures and distance learning requirements resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-364 (Skinner) - Pupil meals: Free School Meals For All Act of 2021.

(1) Requires the Department of Social Services to issue Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) benefits to certain low-income students for each summer break, contingent on an appropriation; and (2) makes various changes to free and-reduced price meal processes at local educational agencies.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-387 (Portantino) - Pupil health: school employee and pupil training: youth mental and behavioral health.

Requires, subject to an appropriation, a local educational agency, on or before January 1, 2025, to certify to the California Department of Education that 75 percent of its classified employees and 75 percent of its certificated employees who have direct contact with pupils at each school have received specified youth behavioral health training.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-525 (Grove) - School closures: mental health effects.

Requires the California Department of Public Health, in consultation with the California Department of Education, to establish a policy to address the mental health effects of school closures on pupils in years when a state or local emergency declaration results in school closures; and requires local educational agencies to adopt that policy, subject to an appropriation for that purpose.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-699 (Eggman) - School climate: statewide school climate indicator: surveys.

(1) Requires the State Board of Education to adopt a statewide school climate indicator consisting of a subset of data from the California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS), adopt standards for school district and individual schoolsite performance and expectations for improvement on that indicator, and to publicly report performance data; (2) requires the California Department of Education, contingent on an appropriation, to make available the CHKS, provide technical assistance to local educational agencies (LEAs), develop a list of approved alternative school climate survey tools, and collect and analyze specified data; and (3) requires LEAs to annually administer the CHKS or an alternative school climate survey that includes a subset of questions from the CHKS.

Status: Assembly-Died - Public Safety

SB-1135 (Jones) - The California Youth Cardiac Screening Pilot Program.

Requires the California Department of Education to establish the California Youth Cardiac Screening Pilot Program, to provide free cardiac screening for pupils in selected schools in grades 5-12 for the 2022-23 to 2024-25 school years.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-1222 (Dahle) - Comprehensive sexual health education and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention education.

Amends the California Healthy Youth Act by requiring local educational agencies to adopt a policy at a publicly noticed meeting specifying how parents and guardians of pupils may inspect the written and audiovisual educational materials used in comprehensive sexual health education and HIV prevention education.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

SB-1302 (Portantino) - Pupil health: pupil wellness centers: grant program.

Allocates \$250,000 for the Superintendent of Public Instruction to provide grants to high schools to establish or improve school-based health centers that provide mental health services provided or supervised by an appropriately licensed or credentialed mental health professional.

Status: Senate-In Floor Process

SB-1308 (Caballero) - Public educational institutions: purchase of nondomestic agricultural food products.

(1) Requires, as of January 1, 2024, local educational agencies (LEAs) that solicit bids for the purchase of an agricultural product to accept a bid or price for that agricultural product when it is grown in California before accepting a bid or price for a product that is grown outside of California unless the bid or price of the California-grown agricultural product exceeds the lowest bid or price of the domestic agricultural product produced outside the state by 25 percent; (2) prohibits the California Community Colleges, California State University, and all LEAs, and encourages the University of California, from purchasing agricultural food products grown, packed, or processed nondomestically unless the price of the nondomestic product is more than 25 percent lower than the bid or price of the domestic product and the quality of the product is comparable to the product grown in California. The contents of this bill were subsequently amended into SB 490 (Caballero), which was not heard by this committee.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-1479 (Pan) - COVID-19 testing in schools: COVID-19 testing plans.

(1) Requires the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) to coordinate COVID-19 testing programs in local educational agencies (LEAs) funded by federal resources or organized under the California COVID-19 Testing Task Force; (2) permits CDPH to provide supportive services, as specified, related to LEA testing plans and testing programs for teachers, staff, pupils, and surrounding communities that help LEAs reopen and operate safely for in-person learning; and (3) requires schools to create a COVID-19 testing plan consistent with CDPH guidance, as specified.

Status: Chapter 850, Statutes of 2022

SB-1481 (Becker) - Preschools, child daycare facilities, and Trustline providers: meals.

Establishes, subject to an appropriation, a free, universal meal program through the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) by increasing state reimbursement to the existing federal meal program for children in the California State Preschool Program, general child care, and specified licensed-exempt care. Expands eligibility for free meals in these programs and creates a grant program to encourage expansion and participation in the CACFP in underserved communities.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

AB-58 (Salas) - Pupil health: suicide prevention policies and training.

Requires a local educational agency (LEA), on or before January 1, 2025, to review and update its policy on pupil suicide prevention, and encourages LEAs commencing with

the 2024-25 school year, to provide suicide awareness and prevention training to teachers of pupils in all of the grades served by the local educational agency.

Status: Chapter 428, Statutes of 2022

AB-309 (Gabriel) - Pupil mental health: model referral protocols.

Requires the California Department of Education, subject to an appropriation, to develop, in consultation with various entities, model mental health referral protocols for voluntary use by local educational agencies, and to post the protocols on its website.

Status: Chapter 662, Statutes of 2021

AB-367 (Cristina Garcia) - Menstrual products.

The Menstrual Equity for All Act of 2021, (1) requires, beginning with the 2022-23 school year, all public schools maintaining any combination of classes from grades 6 to 12, inclusive, to stock the school's restrooms at all times with an adequate supply of menstrual products in all women's restrooms and all-gender restrooms, and in at least one men's restroom; and (2) requires the California State University and each community college district, and encourages the University of California, independent institutions of higher education, and private postsecondary educational institutions, to stock an adequate supply of menstrual products at no fewer than one designated and accessible central location on each campus.

Status: Chapter 664, Statutes of 2021

AB-552 (Quirk-Silva) - Integrated School-Based Behavioral Health Partnership Program.

Authorizes a county behavioral health agency (CBHA) and the governing board or governing body of a local educational agency to enter into an Integrated School-Based Behavioral Health Partnership Program to provide prevention and early intervention, and access to, behavioral health and substance use disorder services for pupils at schoolsites.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-558 (Nazarian) - School meals: Child Nutrition Act of 2022.

Requires the California Department of Education to develop guidance for local educational agencies (LEAs) participating in the federal School Breakfast Program that maintain any of grades K-6 on how to serve eligible non-schoolaged children breakfast or a morning snack at an LEA schoolsite. Prior versions of the bill also would have established the California School Plant-Based and Restricted Diet Program, authorizes LEAs to apply for additional reimbursement for serving plant-based food or milk options or restricted diet food options, provides an additional \$1,000 one-time payment to LEAs that serve plant-based or restricted diet food options, establishes a competitive grant to provide up to \$100,000 to LEAs. Components of the prior versions were included in the 2021 Budget.

Status: Chapter 905, Statutes of 2022

AB-563 (Berman) - School-based health programs.

Requires the California Department of Education to establish an Office of School-Based Health Programs for the purpose of improving the operation of, and participation in, school-based health programs, including the Medi-Cal Administrative Activities claiming process (SMAA) and the Local Education Agency Medi-Cal billing option program (LEA BOP). This bill was absorbed into the 2021-22 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-586 (O'Donnell) - Pupil health: health and mental health services: School Health Demonstration Project.

Establishes, subject to an appropriation for this purpose, the School Health Demonstration Project to provide intensive technical assistance to selected local educational agencies to enable the long-term sustainable provision of health and mental health services to pupils. This bill was absorbed into the 2021-22 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-748 (Carrillo) - Pupil mental health: mental health assistance posters.

(1) Requires, on or before the start of the 2023–24 school year, each schoolsite in a school district, county office of education, or charter school serving pupils in any of grades 6 to 12 to create a poster that identifies approaches and shares resources regarding pupil mental health; and (2) requires the California Department of Education to develop a model poster.

Status: Chapter 431, Statutes of 2022

AB-856 (Maienschein) - Pupil health: COVID-19 Youth Health Information Act.

Establishes the COVID-19 Youth Health Information Act and requires the California Department of Education to: (1) post on its internet website information related to the safe return of pupils to exercise and physical activity after exhibiting signs or symptoms of, or testing positive for, COVID-19; (2) monitor the best practices and evolving guidelines on the safe return of pupils; and (3) encourage schools and school districts to give pupils and their parents and guardians ready access to this information.

Status: Chapter 123, Statutes of 2021

AB-1797 (Akilah Weber) - Immunization registry.

Requires, rather than permits, health care providers and specified agencies that have access to immunization information to disclose certain information from a patient medical record or a client record to the California Department of Public Health and local health departments. This bill adds “patient’s or client’s race and ethnicity” to the list of information collected for purposes of immunization information and reminder systems.

This bill adds two purposes that health care providers and education, childcare, and human services agencies may use individual immunization information.

Status: Chapter 582, Statutes of 2022

AB-1810 (Levine) - Pupil health: seizure disorders.

Authorizes a trained employee volunteer to administer emergency anti-seizure medication to a pupil upon the request of the parent, requires the development of state standards for the training, and requires the parent to provide specified information to the local educational agencies, including a seizure action plan.

Status: Chapter 906, Statutes of 2022

AB-2034 (O'Donnell) - Local educational agency: Medi-Cal billing option.

Requires the Department of Health Care Services to revise its audit process for the Local Education Agency Medi-Cal Billing Option Program (LEA BOP) and provide technical assistance to local education agencies.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-2124 (Cristina Garcia) - Pupil Support Training Program.

Requires the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, upon an appropriation, to develop, administer, and award the Pupil Peer Support Training Program grant, as established in this bill, on a competitive basis to local educational agencies serving pupils in grades 9 to 12 to establish a peer support training program.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-2329 (Carrillo) - Pupil health: vision examinations: schoolsites.

(1) Authorizes a local education agency and charter schools to enter into a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with a nonprofit vision examination provider, including, but not limited to, a nonprofit mobile vision examination provider; requires notification to parents; and (2) deems that informed medical consent has been given if the parent does not opt-out of the examination in writing.

Status: Chapter 911, Statutes of 2022

AB-2508 (Quirk-Silva) - Pupil services: educational counseling.

Urges the governing board of a local educational agency to provide a comprehensive educational counseling program for all pupils and redefines the definition of educational counseling and services provided to pupils to reflect current practices.

Status: Chapter 153, Statutes of 2022

AB-2640 (Valladares) - Pupil health: food allergies: California Food Allergy Resource internet web page.

Requires the California Department of Education to create the “California Food Allergy Resource Guide” for voluntary use by local educational agencies to protect pupils with food allergies.

Status: Chapter 794, Statutes of 2022

INSTRUCTION AND CURRICULUM

SB-217 (Dahle) - Comprehensive sexual health education and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention education.

Requires school districts to adopt a policy at a publicly noticed meeting specifying how parents and guardians of pupils may inspect the written and audiovisual educational materials used in comprehensive sexual health education and HIV prevention education.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-224 (Portantino) - Pupil instruction: mental health education.

Requires schools that offer one or more courses in health education to pupils in middle school or high school to include in those courses instruction in mental health, as specified.

Status: Chapter 675, Statutes of 2021

SB-309 (Leyva) - School finance: college readiness: grants and notification.

(1) Establishes the A–G Completion Improvement Grant Program, contingent upon an appropriation, for the purpose of providing additional supports to local educational agencies to help increase the number of California high school pupils, particularly unduplicated pupils, who graduate from high school eligible to attend a University of California (UC) or California State University (CSU); (2) increases notification requirements regarding high school graduation requirements and UC/CSU admission requirements; and (3) commencing with the 2026-27 school year, requires charter schools and county offices of education to meet the same requirement as school districts to offer to all otherwise qualified pupils a course of study fulfilling the requirements and prerequisites for admission to the UC/CSU in a timely manner. The contents of this bill were included in the 2021 Budget.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-693 (Stern) - Pupil instruction: genocide education: the Holocaust.

(1) Establishes a 15-member Governor’s Council on Genocide and Holocaust Education to establish best practices for education on genocide, including the Holocaust, and promote implementation and professional development related to this education; (2)

authorizes the California Department of Education (CDE) to issue grants to local educational agencies (LEAs) for professional development related to the council's work and specifies grants could be either state funds or private funds donated to the CDE; (3) requires CDE, beginning January 1, 2027, to annually conduct a study on the manner in which instruction on genocide is offered at LEAs and provide recommendations for improvements to offering the instruction.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-723 (Rubio) - Pupil instruction: tutoring program: learning loss mitigation.

Establishes the California Leadership, Excellence, Academic, Diversity, and Service-Learning (LEADS) Tutoring Program to assist students in grades K-8 that have been affected by learning losses caused by school closures due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-941 (Portantino) - Local educational agency instruction collaboration agreements: science, technology, engineering, and mathematics: dual language immersion programs.

Authorizes local educational agencies (LEAs) to enter into an agreement with one or more LEAs to offer the same or similar corresponding individual courses or coursework to a student from another LEA who has been impacted disruptions or cancellations in classes in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) or dual language immersion programs, or teacher shortages in those classes or programs.

Status: Chapter 711, Statutes of 2022

SB-1045 (Melendez) - School curriculum: parental review.

Requires (1) classroom instructors to provide, upon request of a parent, a copy of the instructor's lesson plan no later than three business days from the date of the request, and (2) each schoolsite to make its prospectus of curriculum available for physical review and publish the prospectus on its website at least three calendar days before the start of the academic year.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

SB-1363 (Nielsen) - Adopted course of study: Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders.

Encourages schools to adopt a course of study related to Asian American and Pacific Islanders (AAPI) History for grades 1 to 6 and 7 to 12, within the social sciences area.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SR-55 (Portantino) - Italian American Heritage Month.

Resolves that the Legislature designates the month of October 2021, and every October thereafter, as Italian American Heritage Month, and encourages public schools to

highlight and include Italian American achievements and contributions to the culture of California and to take steps to promote the inclusion of Italian American history in elementary and secondary social science textbooks during the revision process for those textbooks.

Status: Senate-Passed

AB-101 (Medina) - Pupil instruction: high school graduation requirements: ethnic studies.

(1) Requires local educational agencies serving grades 9-12, commencing with the 2025-26 school year, to offer at least a one-semester course in ethnic studies; and, (2) adds, commencing with the 2029-30 school year, a semester-long course in ethnic studies to the list of statewide graduation requirements.

Status: Chapter 661, Statutes of 2021

AB-104 (Lorena Gonzalez) - Pupil instruction: retention, grade changes, and exemptions.

(1) Requires local educational agencies, upon receiving a request, to offer the parent a consultation regarding whether a pupil, excluding a pupil in grade 12, should be retained; (2) creates a process for parents to request that students receive a “pass” or “no pass” instead of a letter grade in the 2020-21 academic year and requires that specified institutions of higher education accept a “pass” for credit for admissions purposes; and (3) requires that students who were in their third or fourth year of high school in the 2020-21 and who are not on track to graduate in the 2020–21 or 2021–22 school years be exempted from local graduation requirements and be given the opportunity to complete the coursework required for graduation.

Status: Chapter 41, Statutes of 2021

AB-1039 (Nguyen) - Model curricula: Vietnamese American refugee experience, the Cambodian genocide, and Hmong history and cultural studies.

Extends the deadlines for the Instructional Quality Commission to develop and submit, and for the State Board of Education to adopt, modify, or revise, three model curricula relative to: (1) the Vietnamese American refugee experience, (2) the Cambodian genocide, and (3) Hmong history and cultural studies.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1560 (Daly) - Distance learning: pupil access: computing devices and broadband internet service.

(1) Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) to survey each local educational agency (LEA) and report to the Legislature on the number of pupils without computing devices that meet the minimum performance standard for distance learning,

as determined by the SPI; (2) authorizes the SPI, contingent upon an appropriation, to provide each eligible student with a computing devices that meets that standard; and (3) authorizes the California Department of Technology, upon an appropriation, to enter into a sponsored service agreement on behalf of any LEA with a broadband service provider for the purpose of providing free or reduced-cost residential broadband service to eligible students.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-1718 (Boerner Horvath) - Elementary and secondary education: visual and performing arts and world languages: instructional materials: professional development.

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to allocate funding for the purchase of standards-aligned instructional materials in visual and performing arts (VAPA) and world languages in kindergarten and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, and for professional development in those subjects. This bill was absorbed into the 2022-23 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1939 (Luz Rivas) - Pupil instruction: science requirements: climate change.

Adds content on the causes and effects of, and methods to mitigate and adapt to, climate change to the course of study in the subject of science for grades one to six and grades seven to twelve, requires that appropriate coursework be offered to students no later than the 2023-24 school year. This bill was not heard by this committee.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-2028 (Davies) - Pupil instruction: bicycle and scooter safety instruction.

Authorizes the governing board of any local educational agency to provide time and facilities to public agencies and other organizations, as defined in the Civic Center Act, in addition to a local law enforcement agency, to provide bicycle, scooter, electric bicycle, motorized bicycle, or motorized scooter safety instruction.

Status: Chapter 116, Statutes of 2022

AB-2051 (Cunningham) - Pupil instruction: financial literacy: instructional materials: professional development.

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to allocate funding to local educational agencies and the state special schools for the purchase of standards-aligned instructional materials and professional development in financial literacy. This bill was absorbed into the 2022-23 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2215 (Blanca Rubio) - Pupil instruction: financial education.

Requires the California Department of Education to increase the provision of financial literacy instruction by developing evidence-based curriculum, instructional materials, and professional development resources for local educational agencies, among other activities. This bill was not heard in this committee.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-2284 (Gabriel) - Pupil instruction: digital literacy and media literacy grant program.

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to allocate funding to local educational agencies, charter schools, and the state special schools for professional development and instructional materials related to digital and media literacy. This bill was absorbed into the 2022-23 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2465 (Mia Bonta) - Pupil instruction: third-grade literacy: literacy grant program.

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction, upon appropriation of the Legislature, to administer the Family and Community Literacy: Supporting Literacy and Biliteracy in Schools, Families, and Communities Grant Program and the California Family Literacy Innovation Project to local educational agencies to support early literacy.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SAFE SCHOOLS AND PUPIL PROTECTION

SB-699 (Eggman) - School climate: statewide school climate indicator: surveys.

(1) Requires the State Board of Education to adopt a statewide school climate indicator consisting of a subset of data from the California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS), adopt standards for school district and individual schoolsite performance and expectations for improvement on that indicator, and to publicly report performance data; (2) requires the California Department of Education, contingent on an appropriation, to make available the CHKS, provide technical assistance to local educational agencies (LEAs), develop a list of approved alternative school climate survey tools, and collect and analyze specified data; and (3) requires LEAs to annually administer the CHKS or an alternative school climate survey that includes a subset of questions from the CHKS.

Status: Assembly-Died - Public Safety

SB-722 (Melendez) - Interscholastic athletics: adult supervisors: cardiopulmonary resuscitation training.

Requires a school district or charter school, if it elects to host or sponsor an event that is in or around a swimming pool, to have at least one adult with a valid certification of cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training to be present throughout the duration of the event.

Status: Chapter 679, Statutes of 2021

SB-796 (Bradford) - State parks: state beaches: County of Los Angeles: deed restrictions.

When referred to this committee, the bill would have (1) encouraged comprehensive school safety plan guidelines to additionally include policies and procedures for referring pupils to law enforcement, formal diversion programs, mental health referral protocols, and training in crisis intervention for officers working on campus; (2) prohibited a peace officer employed by a school district from sharing information collected from a pupil with other law enforcement agencies, required such information to only be collected for purposes of the pupil's school records, and prohibited those records from being shared with other law enforcements agencies unless subject to a search warrant; and (3) stated the intent of the Legislature that that a school's role of "loco parentis" when a student is on a schoolsite does not extend to a pupil engaging in distance learning while in the home. The bill was subsequently amended to relate to Bruce's Beach within Manhattan State Beach.

Status: Chapter 435, Statutes of 2021

SB-906 (Portantino) - School safety: mass casualty threats.

(1) Requires local educational agencies to annually provide information to parents or guardians about California's child access prevention laws and laws relating to the safe storage of firearms; (2) requires school officials to report to law enforcement any threat or perceived threat; and (3) requires law enforcement or the school police to conduct an investigation and threat assessment, including a review of the Department of Justice's firearm registry and a search of the school and/or students' property by law enforcement or school police.

Status: Chapter 144, Statutes of 2022

SB-1273 (Bradford) - School safety: mandatory notifications.

Eliminates criminal penalties for "willful disturbance" of a school or school meeting for students and grants a school principal discretion to report an incident to law enforcement if it does not include a firearm or weapon, as specified.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

AB-99 (Irwin) - School safety: crisis intervention and targeted violence prevention program.

Requires the governing board of a school district, on or before August 1, 2023, to adopt policies for the establishment of a crisis intervention and targeted violence prevention program that assists in the identification and assessment of individuals who may be experiencing a crisis or whose behavior may indicate a threat to the health and safety of themselves, pupils, school staff, or other community members, and that provides referrals to appropriate services. This bill originally established the Cradle-to-Career Data System; those provisions were absorbed into the 2021-22 budget.

Status: Senate-Died

AB-312 (Valladares) - School safety: Safe-To-Tell Program.

(1) Establishes the School Safety Division within the California Department of Education; (2) requires the Division to administer the Safe-To-Tell Program to receive anonymous reports of dangerous, violent, or unlawful activity; (3) requires local educational agencies to establish school-based teams of at least three members of the administrative staff at each of its schools to receive notice of reports; and (4) establishes the Safe-To-Tell Program Advisory Committee and requires the advisory committee to provide an annual report to the Governor and Legislature.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-452 (Friedman) - Pupil safety: parental notification: firearm safety laws.

Requires local educational agencies to provide notification to parents of each student about California's child access prevention laws and laws relating to the safe storage of firearms, and requires the California Department of Education to develop model language for this notification in consultation with the Department of Justice.

Status: Chapter 199, Statutes of 2022

AB-2598 (Akilah Weber) - Pupil rights: restorative justice practices.

Requires the California Department of Education, on or before June 1, 2024, to develop and post on its website, evidence-based best practices for restorative justice practices for local educational agencies to implement to improve campus culture and climate.

Status: Chapter 914, Statutes of 2022

AB-2794 (Gipson) - School safety: school climate: professional development: training materials.

Requires the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to allocate funding to local educational agencies and the state special schools for professional development and instructional materials related to de-escalation training.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SCHOOL AND DISTRICT GOVERNANCE

SB-286 (Min) - Elections: Orange County Department of Education.

Requires the election for seats on the Orange County Board of Education to be consolidated within the November statewide general election.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-328 (Portantino) - Local educational agencies: educational programs.

(1) Requires the California Department of Education and the State Department of Social Services to review all after school program funding and provide flexibility to school districts to use up to 20 percent of funds provided for after school programs for before school programs; (2) defines “rural” for purposes of the rural school district exemptions from the provisions regarding school start times and extends those exemptions to rural charter schools; and (3) prohibits a city, county, city and county, county office of education (COE), or school district from imposing any rule, regulation, ordinance, or condition, or from taking any action, that would prohibit or restrict a school district, COE, or charter school from complying with any state law or regulation.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-442 (Newman) - School districts and community college districts: governing board elections: charter cities.

Provides that a county committee on school district organization may approve a proposal to establish trustee areas for the governing board of a community college district or a school district, including a school district whose governing board is provided for in a city’s charter, without a vote of the district’s electorate.

Status: Chapter 139, Statutes of 2021

SB-908 (Pan) - Student Board Member Advisory Commission.

Establishes, until January 1, 2028, the Student Board Member Advisory Commission as a stand-alone state-level body to provide assistance and advice to the student member of the State Board of Education (SBE), the SBE, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Legislature, and the Governor in education policy.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-913 (Hertzberg) - School districts: operations.

Reduces the threshold of average daily attendance, from 400,000 to 250,000, which provides very large school district(s) some flexibility relative to several provisions in the Education Code, thereby reflecting the drop in enrollment in the state’s largest school district(s).

Status: Chapter 920, Statutes of 2022

SB-1170 (Cortese) - School district and community college district elections: signature requirements.

Modifies the timing for holding a special election to fill a vacancy on a school district or community college district governing board when the board makes a provisional appointment to fill that vacancy and the voters of the district submit sufficient signatures on a petition to terminate the appointment and order a special election. The bill was never heard; its contents were subsequently amended into SB 1061 (Laird), which was not heard by this committee.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

SB-1236 (Glazer) - School districts: governing boards: pupil members.

Allows the governing board of a school district to adopt a resolution to make a preferential voting pupil member a full voting pupil member.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-1381 (Allen) - School districts and community college districts: governing board elections: charter cities.

Prohibit a county committee on school district organization from establishing district-based or trustee elections in a charter city that establishes at-large elections as the manner of electing the governing board of a school district or community college district. This bill was never heard.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-824 (Bennett) - Local educational agencies: county boards of education: governing bodies of charter schools: pupil members.

Establishes processes whereby a county board of education or a governing body of a charter school is to include a high school student member, upon petition.

Status: Chapter 669, Statutes of 2021

AB-1546 (Chau) - City of Alhambra: charter amendment: Alhambra Unified School District: California Voting Rights Act.

Authorizes the City of Alhambra to submit a proposal to amend its city charter to remove references to the Alhambra Unified School District at a special election, rather than waiting for the next statewide general election.

Status: Chapter 145, Statutes of 2021

AB-1652 (Medina) - County boards of education: school district governing boards: members: charter school employees.

Prohibits any executive director of a charter school or resource center, or any charter school employee, from being eligible to be a member of the county board of education or governing board of the authorizing school district.

Status: Senate-Died - Elections and Constitutional Amendments

AB-1912 (Mia Bonta) - Emergency apportionments: closure and consolidation requirements.

Requires a school district that is the recipient of an emergency apportionment to follow specified procedures when deciding to close or consolidate schools.

Status: Chapter 253, Statutes of 2022

AB-2072 (Gabriel) - Mental health professionals: natural disasters: county offices of education: personnel sharing agreements.

Requires county offices of education, in consultation with the California Department of Education and other relevant state and local agencies, to coordinate agreements between a local education agency and charter schools within the county to deploy qualified mental health professionals and other key school personnel in the event of a natural disaster or traumatic event.

Status: Chapter 909, Statutes of 2022

AB-2158 (Mike Fong) - Local educational agencies: ethics training.

Requires each member of a governing board of a school district, a county board of education, or the governing body of a charter school, in service as of January 1, 2025, to receive ethics training before January 1, 2026, and at least once every two years thereafter.

Status: Chapter 279, Statutes of 2022

AB-2359 (Gipson) - Compton Community College District: personnel commission.

Establishes a timeline for the reinstatement of Compton Community College District (CCCD) Personnel Commission commencing one year after CCCD's final payment on its state loan.

Status: Chapter 529, Statutes of 2022

AB-2814 (Wood) - Local educational agencies: emergency planning grants.

Requires the California Department of Education to establish and administer the Emergency Planning Grant Program and award \$1 million in competitive grants to local educational agencies to support emergency planning activities, upon appropriation of the Legislature.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

SCHOOL FINANCE AND LOCAL CONTROL FUNDING FORMULA

SB-579 (Allen) - Education finance: local control funding formula.

Creates an average daily attendance hold harmless mechanism for local educational agency apportionments under the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) for the 2021-22 and 2022-23 fiscal years, as specified.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-830 (Portantino) - Education finance: supplemental education funding.

Provides additional LCFF funding to local educational agencies (LEAs) based on a calculation of how much additional funding the LEA would receive if the student count methodology of the LCFF were based on enrollment instead of attendance.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-924 (Glazer) - School districts: annual compensation: reporting.

Requires the State Controller's Office to annually publish on its website information related to school financial transactions and employee compensation.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-1431 (Rubio) - Local control funding formula: base grants: adjustment: class size reduction.

Provides a LCFF base grant increase for school districts and charter schools that have an average class size at each schoolsite for kindergarten and grades 1 to 3, inclusive, of not more than 20 pupils.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

AB-520 (Gipson) - Teacher retention: California Diversifying the Teacher Workforce Grant Program.

Establishes the California Diversifying the Teacher Workforce Grant Program, administered by the California Department of Education, to provide one-time competitive grants to local educational agencies to develop or expand programs that address a local need to develop a teacher workforce that serves all pupil populations, including Black pupils.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1718 (Boerner Horvath) - Elementary and secondary education: visual and performing arts and world languages: instructional materials: professional development.

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to allocate funding for the purchase of standards-aligned instructional materials in visual and performing arts (VAPA) and world languages in kindergarten and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, and for professional development in those subjects. This bill was absorbed into the 2022-23 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1948 (Ting) - Education finance: local control funding formula: low-income pupils: pupils experiencing homelessness.

Requires, commencing with the 2022–23 fiscal year, numerous changes to the calculation of the LCFF. The bill was not heard by this committee at the author's request.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-2774 (Akilah Weber) - Education finance: local control funding formula: supplemental grants: lowest performing pupil subgroup or subgroups.

Expands the definition of "unduplicated pupil" for LCFF purposes by adding a pupil who is classified as a member of the lowest performing subgroup or subgroups.

Status: Assembly-Died

SPECIAL EDUCATION

SB-237 (Portantino) - Special education: dyslexia risk screening.

Requires local education agencies serving students in kindergarten to grade 2 to annually screen all students for risk of dyslexia using state-approved instruments, unless objected to in writing by a student's parent or guardian, beginning in the 2022-23 school year.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-291 (Stern) - Advisory Commission on Special Education: pupil advisory council.

Increases the number of members on the Advisory Commission on Special Education (ACSE), from 17 to 19 members.

Status: Chapter 917, Statutes of 2022

SB-692 (Cortese) - Local control and accountability plans: state priorities: least restrictive environment.

Requires the California Department of Education to publish data related to federal measures of least restrictive environment (LRE) for pupils with disabilities on its internet website and include it as a resource on the California School Dashboard.

Status: Chapter 919, Statutes of 2022

SB-1016 (Portantino) - Special education: eligibility: fetal alcohol spectrum disorder.

Requires the State Board of Education to include “fetal alcohol spectrum disorder” in the regulatory definition of “other health impairment” for the purpose of special education eligibility.

Status: Chapter 611, Statutes of 2022

SB-1113 (Ochoa Bogh) - Special education: inclusive education: universal design for learning.

Requires the California Department of Education, in consultation with the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC), to develop guidance on staffing inclusive classrooms and make recommendations for changes necessary to eliminate barriers to staffing inclusive placements, and to train the members of the Instructional Quality Commission on the principles and strategies of universal design for learning; and requires the CTC to form a workgroup to propose more inclusive education standards for the administrative services teaching credential and to require administrator preparation programs to include inclusive education instruction, as specified.

Status: Senate-In Floor Process

SJR-4 (Wilk) - Special education funding.

Memorializes the United States Congress and the President of the United States to reintroduce and enact legislation similar to H.R. 2902, introduced in 2017, or S. 866, introduced in 2019, which would fully fund the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Status: Chapter 114, Statutes of 2022

AB-126 (Eduardo Garcia) - Special education programs: Family Empowerment Centers on Disability.

Requires the establishment of additional Family Empowerment Centers on Disability (FECs), establishes increased funding levels awarded to each FEC, establishes new requirements for data collection and reporting to the California Department of Education (CDE), and requires the CDE to \$20 million in one-time funding to FECs and other organizations to support families of students with disabilities whose education has been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The bill was not heard by this committee at the author's request.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-967 (Frazier) - Special education: COVID-19 Special Education Fund.

Establishes the COVID-19 Special Education Fund, for purposes of providing matching funds, on a one-to-one basis, to support local educational agencies in conducting activities to prevent and intervene early in conflicts, conduct voluntary alternative

dispute resolution, and provide services to pupils with disabilities relating to impacts to learning associated with COVID-19 school disruptions.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-2121 (Eduardo Garcia) - School accountability: California Collaborative for Educational Excellence: special education resource leads.

Establishes a special education resource lead project to provide training and technical assistance on family support and alternative dispute resolution (ADR) in special education.

Status: Assembly-Died

STAFFING AND ADMINISTRATIVE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

SB-205 (Leyva) - School and community college employees: absences due to illness or accident.

Repeals existing laws requiring public school and community college employees to pay for the cost of their substitutes while out on extended illness leave.

Status: Senate-Died

AB-388 (Medina) - Certificated school employees: probationary employees.

Changes which credentialed employees can attain permanent employee status and removes differences of employment practices for school districts with less than 250 average daily attendance and employees who were in their probationary period prior to the 1983-84 fiscal year.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2038 (Gipson) - School finance: administrative employees to teacher ratio.

Allows the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD), for purposes of calculating the administrative employee-to-teacher ratio in the 2022–23 to 2024–25 school years, inclusive, to include in the definition of “teacher” intervention specialists and teacher coaches, as specified. This bill also requires LAUSD to submit various reports related to the administrative employee-to-teacher ratio to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Department of Finance, and the budget committees of both houses of the Legislature.

Status: Chapter 908, Statutes of 2022

AB-2045 (Jones-Sawyer) - School district, county office of education, and community college district employees: personnel commissions: ranked groups.

Authorizes school (K-12) and community college (CCC) personnel commissions to use a banded system of ranking for job eligibility employment lists instead of the current requirement to use Rank of Three lists, if approved in an election by the majority of classified employees voting, as specified, in order to provide greater flexibility to recruit diversified staff.

Status: Senate-Died

TECHNOLOGY AND DATA

SB-767 (Becker) - Educational technology: Digital Education Equity Program: regional consortia: State Digital Equity Plan.

(1) Establishes the Digital Education Equity Program to be administered by the California Department of Education (CDE) to provide a regionalized network of technical assistance to local educational agencies (LEAs) on the implementation of educational technology; (2) requires CDE in consultation with the executive director of the State Board of Education, upon approval of the State Digital Equity Plan, to authorize grants to fund lead county offices of education to administer the services to LEAs located within that region; (3) requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to develop guidelines and criteria for LEA education technology equity plans and a template of a summary of the local education technology equity plan as a component of a local control and accountability plan; (4) requires LEAs, by December 1, 2024, to adopt a local education technology equity plan; (5) requires the newly established Office of Educational Technology to prepare a comprehensive State Digital Equity Plan.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-876 (Becker) - Educational technology: Digital Education Equity Program: county offices of education.

Creates a program at the California Department of Education, in coordination with county offices of education, to provide technical assistance and teacher professional development to local educational agencies on educational technology.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

AB-22 (McCarty) - California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System: data collection.

Requires the California Department of Education to collect specified student-level data relative to enrollment in California state preschool programs operated by local educational agencies to provide longitudinal data. Prior versions of the bill would have

expanded eligibility for enrollment in transitional kindergarten to younger four-year olds, adding one month of eligibility each year over a nine year period to eventually make all four-year olds eligible (transitional kindergarten expansion was included in the 2021 Budget).

Status: Chapter 901, Statutes of 2022

AB-498 (Quirk-Silva) - Teachers: Computer Science Access Initiative.

Establishes the Computer Science Access Initiative to increase the number of teachers who are authorized and trained to provide computer science instruction in California public schools. The bill was subsequently amended to relate to county organized health systems.

Status: Chapter 430, Statutes of 2022

AB-1560 (Daly) - Distance learning: pupil access: computing devices and broadband internet service.

(1) Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) to survey each local educational agency (LEA) and report to the Legislature on the number of pupils without computing devices that meet the minimum performance standard for distance learning, as determined by the SPI; (2) authorizes the SPI, contingent upon an appropriation, to provide each eligible student with a computing devices that meets that standard; and (3) authorizes the California Department of Technology, upon an appropriation, to enter into a sponsored service agreement on behalf of any LEA with a broadband service provider for the purpose of providing free or reduced-cost residential broadband service to eligible students.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-2355 (Salas) - School cybersecurity.

Requires a Local Educational Agency to report a cyberattack impacting 500 or more pupils or personnel to report to the California Cybersecurity Integration Center (Cal-CSIC) and requires the Cal-CSIC to annually report to the Governor and relevant policy committees of the Legislature with specified information related to the cyberattack.

Status: Chapter 498, Statutes of 2022

THE TEACHING PROFESSION

SB-488 (Rubio) - Teacher credentialing: reading instruction.

Requires the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) to ensure, by July 1, 2025, that an approved teaching performance assessment (TPA) for a preliminary multiple subject credential and a preliminary education specialist credential assesses all candidates for competence in instruction in literacy, revises the definition of literacy instruction for purposes of teacher preparation and requires the CTC to ensure that its

standards for program quality and effectiveness align to this definition, and provides an alternate means of meeting the current reading instruction competence assessment (RICA) for some credential candidates affected by COVID-19 test center closures.

Status: Chapter 678, Statutes of 2021

SB-1229 (McGuire) - Mental Health Workforce Grant Program.

Requires, upon appropriation by the Legislature, the California Student Aid Commission to administer the Mental Health Workforce Grant Program, as established by this bill, to increase the number of mental health professionals serving children and youth.

Status: Assembly-Died - Higher Education

SB-1397 (Borgeas) - Substitute teachers: days of service.

Requires the Commission on Teacher Credentialing to waive the basic skills proficiency requirement for the issuance of an emergency 30-day substitute teaching permit until July 1, 2024.

Status: Chapter 335, Statutes of 2022

SB-1487 (Rubio) - Commission on Teacher Credentialing: survey: teachers exiting the profession.

Requires the CTC and the California Department of Education to develop, and local educational agencies to annually administer and report on, a survey of teachers exiting the profession.

Status: Chapter 924, Statutes of 2022

AB-320 (Medina) - Teacher preparation programs: regionally accredited institutions.

Clarifies that an individual who earned a bachelor's degree at a higher education institution that was in the process of gaining full regional accreditation is eligible to enter a teacher training program and earn their credential.

Status: Chapter 663, Statutes of 2021

AB-437 (Kalra) - Employee obligations: exclusivity requirements: actors.

Authorizes a candidate for a preliminary multiple or single subject teaching credential to demonstrate subject matter competence by completing higher education coursework in the subjects related to the content area of the credential, or through a combination of higher education coursework, a subject matter program, and/or a subject matter examination. The bill was amended to relate to the exclusivity rights of actors prior to being heard by this committee.

Status: Senate-Died

AB-520 (Gipson) - Teacher retention: California Diversifying the Teacher Workforce Grant Program.

Establishes the California Diversifying the Teacher Workforce Grant Program, administered by the California Department of Education, to provide one-time competitive grants to local educational agencies to develop or expand programs that address a local need to develop a teacher workforce that serves all pupil populations, including Black pupils.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1876 (Seyarto) - Substitute teachers: emergency career substitute teaching permit: employment verification.

Requires the CTC, when issuing an initial emergency career substitute teaching permit, to accept employment verification for the previous consecutive three year period from one or more California school districts participating in a consortium in determining the accumulated work days per year.

Status: Chapter 113, Statutes of 2022

AB-1893 (Cunningham) - Teacher credentialing: emergency teaching permits.

Requires the CTC to waive the basic skills proficiency requirement for the issuance of an emergency 30-day substitute teaching permit until July 1, 2024.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-2401 (McCarty) - Teacher preparation programs: planning grants and implementation or expansion grants.

Expands and makes changes to a grant program, administered by the CTC, for the development of integrated programs of teacher preparation, in which an individual may earn a teaching credential while completing their undergraduate degree.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2565 (Blanca Rubio) - School employees: professional development: mathematics and science.

Appropriates \$62 million to create the California Partnership for Math and Science Education (CAPMSE) over three fiscal years to strengthen the statewide infrastructure and capacity to support teacher professional development in science and mathematics. The bill was not heard by this committee at the request of the author.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-2573 (McCarty) - Certificated school employees: probationary employees.

Changes which credentialed employees can attain permanent employee status and removes differences of employment practices for school districts with less than 250 average daily attendance and employees who were in their probationary period prior to the 1983-84 fiscal year.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2694 (Blanca Rubio) - Teacher credentialing: teacher induction programs: Beginning Teacher Retention and Support Grant.

Establishes the beginning teacher retention and support grant program to fund teacher induction program costs, administered by the CTC.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

TRANSPORTATION

SB-111 (Newman) - Schoolbuses: stop requirements.

Authorizes a school district to install and operate an automated video traffic enforcement system on the outside of a schoolbus, in addition to any other monitoring devices lawfully authorized to be installed in or on a schoolbus, for the purpose of enforcing violations related to the requirement for vehicles to stop when a schoolbus displays a flashing red light signal and stop signal arm. The bill was not heard.

Status: Senate-Died - Transportation

SB-878 (Skinner) - School transportation.

Authorizes local educational agencies (LEAs) to offer home-to-school transportation to all students beginning in the 2027-28 school year, establishes the Transportation Access to Public Schools Fund to reimburse LEAs for their transportation costs, and establishes minimum qualifications for any driver providing transportation services to students. The bill was subsequently amended to convene a workgroup to provide recommendations on safety standards for drivers of unaccompanied minors to school.

Status: Assembly-Died

AB-2731 (Ting) - Schoolbuses: zero-emission vehicles.

Requires that, commencing January 1, 2035, all newly purchased or contracted schoolbuses of a local educational agency be zero-emission vehicles.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2933 (O'Donnell) - School transportation: apportionments.

Increases state funding for home-to-school transportation.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

OTHER LEGISLATION

SB-34 (Umberg) - Libraries: student success cards.

When heard by this committee, the bill required the California Department of Education to administer a competitive grant program to award one-time grant funding to local educational agencies, library districts, and public libraries for the purpose of providing every public school student with a student success card. The bill was subsequently amended to relate to public contracts.

Status: Chapter 297, Statutes of 2022

SB-254 (Borgeas) - Public schools: September 11th Remembrance Day.

Designates September 11 of each year as September 11th Remembrance Day, a day having special significance, and encourages each public elementary and secondary school to observe a moment of silence at an appropriate time while school is in session.

Status: Chapter 102, Statutes of 2021

SB-363 (Leyva) - Educational equity: government instruction conferences.

Beginning January 1, 2023, conditions the existing exemption for Boys State and Girls State conferences from sex discrimination statutes on the provision of substantially similar access and opportunities for participants.

Status: Chapter 676, Statutes of 2021

SB-540 (Limón) - Pupil instruction: improving pupil success: grant program.

Requires the California Department of Education, subject to an appropriation, to administer a grant program to provide additional targeted assistance to 10 low-performing school districts with identified opportunity gaps among their peers, including but not limited to, opportunity gaps for pupils of color and pupils from low-income backgrounds, to help those school districts close their opportunity gaps.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-1057 (Committee on Education) - Committee on Education. Elementary and secondary education: omnibus bill.

Makes technical, clarifying, conforming, and other non-controversial revisions to a number of provisions in the Education Code.

Status: Chapter 301, Statutes of 2022

SB-1190 (Hertzberg) - Department of Technology: California Trust Framework.

When the bill was referred to out committee it required, by January 1, 2024, the California Department of Technology to create a California Trust Framework to provide industry standards and best practices regarding the issuance of cryptographically

secure credentials to verify information about a person or legal entity, but was subsequently amended to delete a role for CDE and was not heard by this committee.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-486 (Committee on Education) - Elementary and secondary education: omnibus bill.

The annual K-12 education policy omnibus bill, makes technical, clarifying, conforming, and other non-controversial revisions to a number of provisions in the Education Code.

Status: Chapter 666, Statutes of 2021

AB-945 (Ramos) - Pupils: adornments at school graduation ceremonies: task force.

Establishes a task force to, among other things, develop recommendations for best practices, protocols, proposed legislation, and other policies that will address how to comprehensively implement all aspects of a student's authority to wear traditional tribal regalia or recognized objects of religious or cultural significance as an adornment at school graduation ceremonies, as specifically authorized by existing law.

Status: Chapter 285, Statutes of 2021

AB-1655 (Jones-Sawyer) - State holidays: Juneteenth.

(1) Establishes June 19, known as "Juneteenth," as a state holiday; (2) requires public schools serving any of grades K-12 and community colleges to close on June 19 to observe Juneteenth; (3) and authorizes state employees to elect to take time off with pay in recognition of Juneteenth.

Status: Chapter 753, Statutes of 2022

AB-1718 (Boerner Horvath) - Elementary and secondary education: visual and performing arts and world languages: instructional materials: professional development.

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to allocate funding for the purchase of standards-aligned instructional materials in visual and performing arts (VAPA) and world languages in kindergarten and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, and for professional development in those subjects. This bill was absorbed into the 2022-23 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1801 (Nazarian) - State holidays: Genocide Remembrance Day.

Adds April 24, known as "Genocide Remembrance Day," to the list of state holidays. Additionally, this bill authorizes state employees to elect to take time off with pay in recognition of "Genocide Remembrance Day," as specified, and authorizes community colleges and public schools to close on April 24, known as "Genocide Remembrance Day," as specified.

Status: Chapter 761, Statutes of 2022

AB-2116 (McCarty) - Service learning: California Serves Pilot Program.

Contingent upon an appropriation, establishes the California Serves Pilot Program for purposes of engaging pupils in grade 12, and requires the California Department of Education, in collaboration with CaliforniaVolunteers, to conduct a study on ways to incorporate impactful service learning for pupils in grade 12.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2337 (Megan Dahle) - School districts: frontier school district.

Defines “frontier school district” as a school district with a total average daily attendance at all of its schools of fewer than 600 students, or is in a county in which the total population density is fewer than 10 people per square mile.

Status: Chapter 83, Statutes of 2022

AB-2548 (Nazarian) - California Kids Investment and Development Savings Program.

Increases the initial seed deposit for the California Kids Investment and Development Savings (CaKIDS) Program from at least \$25 to at least \$100.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-2821 (Nazarian) - California Kids Investment and Development Savings Program.

An urgency measure, delays the submission of the California Kids Investment and Development Savings (CaKIDS) Program implementation report by the ScholarShare Investment Board to the Department of Finance and the Legislature from June 30, 2022, and annually thereafter, to June 30, 2023, and annually thereafter.

Status: Chapter 164, Statutes of 2022

ACR-53 (Ward) - Purple Star School Program.

Requests the California Department of Education (CDE) to establish and manage a program designating schools as Purple Star Schools when schools support military connected students in specified ways, and requests the CDE to use the Military Child Education Coalition for resources and information regarding establishing and managing a Purple Star School Program in California.

Status: Chapter 57, Statutes of 2021

HIGHER EDUCATION

ACCESS / SUCCESS

SB-416 (Hueso) - Corrections: educational programs.

Requires the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to make college programs provided by the various California college systems or other regionally accredited, nonprofit colleges or universities in the state available to state prison inmates with a general educational development (GED) certificate or a high school diploma, establishes a set of criteria to be used to prioritize those college programs, and defines the responsibilities of those college education providers.

Status: Chapter 766, Statutes of 2021

SB-737 (Limón) - California Student Opportunity and Access Program.

Modifies and expands criteria for which the California Student Aid Commission may apportion funds to support projects under the California Student Opportunity and Access program (Cal-SOAP). This bill additionally expands duties and responsibilities of funded projects.

Status: Chapter 575, Statutes of 2021

SB-785 (Glazer) - Public postsecondary education: California Promise program: California State University students.

Requires at least 5 percent of each incoming class to participate in the California Promise program at each campus of the California State University; and requires that at least 70 percent of those participants be low-income students, first-generation students, or students from underrepresented communities.

Status: Senate-In Floor Process

SB-1080 (Min) - College and career fairs.

Requires a school district or school planning to hold a college or career fair to notify each community college districts that has overlapping jurisdiction.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

AB-417 (McCarty) - Rising Scholars Network: justice-involved students.

Authorizes the California Community College Chancellor's Office to establish a grant program within community colleges to provide additional funds for services in support of postsecondary education for formerly and currently incarcerated students.

Status: Chapter 558, Statutes of 2021

AB-914 (Akilah Weber) - Public postsecondary education: California State University: proficiency level of entering students.

Modifies the requirements of an existing report the California State University (CSU) Chancellor's Office annually submits to the Legislature to include additional elements pertaining to freshmen student placement in CSU courses. It further changes the existing annual report deadline from February 1, to April 1, and eliminates an interim report currently due December 15 of each year.

Status: Chapter 564, Statutes of 2021

AB-928 (Berman) - Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act of 2021: Associate Degree for Transfer Intersegmental Implementation Committee.

Requires the California State University and University of California to jointly establish a singular lower division general education pathway for transfer admission into both segments, and also requires California Community Colleges to place students who declare a goal of transfer on an Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) pathway for their intended major. Further, this bill also establishes the ADT intersegmental implementation committee to serve as the primary entity charged with oversight of the ADT.

Status: Chapter 566, Statutes of 2021

AB-1111 (Berman) - Postsecondary education: common course numbering system.

Requires, by July 1, 2024, the California Community Colleges to adopt a common course numbering system. This bill provides that the common course numbering system shall be student facing and ensure that comparable courses across all community colleges have the same course number.

Status: Chapter 568, Statutes of 2021

AB-1187 (Irwin) - Community colleges: tutoring.

Expands the type of noncredit courses that are eligible for state apportionment funding to include supervised tutoring for foundational skills, and for degree-applicable and transfer level courses authorized by the California Community College's Board of Governors by July 31, 2023.

Status: Chapter 927, Statutes of 2022

AB-1958 (Mike Fong) - The Community College Student Access, Retention, and Debt Cancellation Program.

Establishes the Community College Student Access, Retention, and Debt Cancellation Program to provide fiscal incentives to encourage the enrollment and re-enrollment of students at the California Community Colleges.

Status: Chapter 929, Statutes of 2022

ACCOUNTABILITY AND COORDINATION

SB-770 (Roth) - College and Career Access Pathways partnerships: California LAW Pathways: appropriation.

Makes \$10 million available to the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges, upon appropriation in the annual Budget Act, for the purposes of expanding pathways to law school programs.

Status: Assembly-Died

SB-1288 (Umberg) - Hastings College of the Law.

Modifies provisions that name Hastings College of the Law by striking references to its founder S.C. Hastings, and re-designates the law college as College of the Law.

Status: Senate-Died

AB-545 (Quirk) - University of California: major tax expenditures: research.

Requests the Regents of the University of California, through a new or existing research center, to perform a comprehensive assessment of "major tax expenditures," as defined.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-928 (Berman) - Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act of 2021: Associate Degree for Transfer Intersegmental Implementation Committee.

Requires the California State University and University of California to jointly establish a singular lower division general education pathway for transfer admission into both segments, and also requires California Community Colleges to place students who declare a goal of transfer on an Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) pathway for their intended major. Further, this bill also establishes the ADT intersegmental implementation committee to serve as the primary entity charged with oversight of the ADT.

Status: Chapter 566, Statutes of 2021

AB-1002 (Choi) - Postsecondary education: course credit for prior military education, training, and service.

Requires the California State University (CSU) Chancellor's Office, in collaboration with the CSU Academic Senate, and requests the University of California, by September 1, 2022, to develop a consistent policy for awarding course credit for prior military education, training, and service, as specified.

Status: Chapter 567, Statutes of 2021

AB-1215 (Boerner Horvath) - Public postsecondary education: University of California: admissions policy: systemwide protocols.

Requests the University of California (UC) Board of Regents to adopt policies directing the UC Office of the President to establish various systemwide protocols pertaining to undergraduate admissions.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-1764 (Medina) - Public postsecondary education: student housing: survey.

Require the California State University and the California Community Colleges, and request the University of California, to collect data on student housing insecurity at each of their respective campuses and report to Legislature and the Legislative Analyst's Office. The provisions of this bill sunset January 1, 2028. This bill was absorbed into the 2022-23 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1936 (Ramos) - University of California: Hastings College of the Law.

Modifies provisions relative to the Hastings College of the Law by striking references throughout the Education Code of its founder, S.C. Hastings. This bill also re-designates Hastings College of the Law as the "College of the Law, San Francisco," and specifies a process for renaming the college.

Status: Chapter 478, Statutes of 2022

AB-2738 (Reyes) - Public postsecondary education: community colleges: matriculation: assessment.

Requires California Community Colleges to make available information regarding course schedules and degree completion, and to either offer courses associated with degrees and certificates within a specified timeline or report to the public and the California Community College Chancellor's Office the reasons why the college cannot provide the courses within the specified timeline.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

ADMISSION AND ELIGIBILITY

AB-233 (Boerner Horvath) - Public postsecondary education: University of California: admissions.

Requests the University of California (UC) Regents to adopt a policy directing the UC Office of the President implement various California State Auditor recommendations related to the general student admission procedures to be effective for the UC's 2023 admissions cycle.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-251 (Choi) - Public postsecondary education: admission by exception.

Prohibits certain senior administrators from being one of the three senior administrators tasked with approving students' admission by exception applications to a campus within the California State University and if adopted by the University of California (UC) Board of Regents, the UC system.

Status: Chapter 47, Statutes of 2021

AB-595 (Medina) - Public postsecondary education: University of California and California State University: student eligibility policy.

Requires the Trustees of the California State University and requests the Regents of the University of California to engage in the specified process before making any change in undergraduate student eligibility policy that adds new eligibility requirements.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1796 (Choi) - Public postsecondary education: reenrollment.

Requests the University of California Regents and requires the California State University Trustees to require each campus of their respective systems to grant students the right to reenroll in their baccalaureate degree program after withdrawing or stopping out if the students was in good academic standing with the university.

Status: Chapter 323, Statutes of 2022

ADULT EDUCATION

AB-1491 (McCarty) - Adult education: consortia: carryover of allocated funds.

Authorizes an adult education consortium to reduce a member's allocation by no more than the amount of the member's carryover if the consortium makes a finding, by a majority vote, if the member has had excessive carryover for at least two consecutive years.

Status: Chapter 519, Statutes of 2022

CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION

AB-1942 (Muratsuchi) - Community colleges: funding: instructional service agreements with public safety agencies.

Authorizes a community college district that participate in an instructional service agreement (ISA) with a public safety entity to submit a copy of their most up to date ISAs and other specified information to the Chancellor's Office for review.

Status: Chapter 930, Statutes of 2022

COMMUNITY COLLEGE FUNDING

SB-436 (Dahle) - Community colleges: nonresident tuition.

Removes the sunset date of provisions in current law which authorize Lake Tahoe Community College to waive non-resident tuition fees and claim apportionment for a limited number of students that reside in the Nevada communities of the Lake Tahoe Basin, thereby making the authorization permanent.

Status: Chapter 573, Statutes of 2021

SB-659 (Becker) - Community colleges: California College Promise.

Authorizes a community college district to charge an enrollment fee that is lower than the amount established in statute to students who do not already benefit from existing fee waiver policies. The bill also allows a district to use California College Promise funds to assist students with their total cost of college attendance.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-770 (Roth) - College and Career Access Pathways partnerships: California LAW Pathways: appropriation.

Makes \$10 million available to the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges, upon appropriation in the annual Budget Act, for the purposes of expanding pathways to law school programs.

Status: Assembly-Died

SB-893 (Becker) - Community colleges: San Mateo County Community College District: California College Promise.

Authorizes, until July 1, 2028, San Mateo County Community College District to use their unrestricted general funds to establish a tuition fee waiver and to provide financial assistance for the total cost of attendance for qualifying students, as defined.

Status: Chapter 937, Statutes of 2022

AB-417 (McCarty) - Rising Scholars Network: justice-involved students.

Authorizes the California Community College Chancellor's Office to establish a grant program within community colleges to provide additional funds for services in support of postsecondary education for formerly and currently incarcerated students.

Status: Chapter 558, Statutes of 2021

AB-421 (Ward) - Community colleges: career development and college preparation courses.

When heard by this committee, the bill allowed the funding determination for career development and college preparation courses to be calculated based on either ongoing attendance counts or a census date count, as specified. The bill was subsequently amended to relate to changing gender and sex identifiers on official documents.

Status: Chapter 40, Statutes of 2022

AB-576 (Maienschein) - Community colleges: apportionments: waiver of open course provisions: military personnel.

Authorizes community college districts to collect per-student apportionment funding for courses taught on military bases, except under certain circumstances.

Status: Chapter 562, Statutes of 2021

AB-914 (Akilah Weber) - Public postsecondary education: California State University: proficiency level of entering students.

Modifies the requirements of an existing report the California State University (CSU) Chancellor's Office annually submits to the Legislature to include additional elements pertaining to freshmen student placement in CSU courses. It further changes the existing annual report deadline from February 1, to April 1, and eliminates an interim report currently due December 15 of each year.

Status: Chapter 564, Statutes of 2021

AB-1187 (Irwin) - Community colleges: tutoring.

Expands the type of noncredit courses that are eligible for state apportionment funding to include supervised tutoring for foundational skills, and for degree-applicable and transfer level courses authorized by the California Community College's Board of Governors by July 31, 2023.

Status: Chapter 927, Statutes of 2022

AB-1505 (Rodriguez) - Community colleges: full-time faculty obligation.

Requires the California Community College Board of Governors to adopt regulations that require the fall of 2023 full-time faculty obligation number (FON) from each community college district to be set to the actual full-time faculty number reported for fall of 2022.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-1998 (Smith) - Community colleges: nonresident tuition fees: Western Undergraduate Exchange.

(1) Authorizes the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges to enter into the Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) through the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE); (2) allows small community college districts located near a bordering state to charge a lower tuition rate to out-of-state students from WUE participating states; and (3) decreases the per-unit fee for eligible resident students from three, to one and one-half, times the amount established for resident students.

Status: Chapter 495, Statutes of 2022

FACILITIES

SB-22 (Glazer) - Education finance: school facilities: Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act of 2022.

Makes changes to the existing School Facility Program and places the Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act on the ballot for statewide elections in 2022.

Status: Assembly-Died - Education

SB-330 (Durazo) - California Community Colleges: affordable housing.

Requires the Los Angeles Community College District (LACCD) to develop a pilot program to provide affordable housing to students or employees of LACCD and allows, for purposes of developing affordable housing, LACCD to enter into agreements with nonprofit or private entities to lease real property under certain conditions.

Status: Chapter 572, Statutes of 2021

AB-846 (Low) - Local Agency Public Construction Act: job order contracting.

Extends the existing authority for school and community college districts to administer job order contracting (JOC), an alternative construction contracting agreement, until January 1, 2027.

Status: Chapter 303, Statutes of 2021

AB-1377 (McCarty) - Student housing plans.

Requires the California State University, and requests the University of California, to conduct a student housing needs assessment, by campus, and create a student housing plan outlining how they will meet their projected student housing needs.

Status: Chapter 571, Statutes of 2021

AB-2232 (McCarty) - School facilities: heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems.

Requires a school district, county office of education, charter school, private school, the California Community Colleges, the California State University, and requests the University of California, to ensure that facilities, including classrooms for students, have heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems that meet minimum ventilation rate requirements, as specified, and to install filtration that achieves minimum efficiency reporting values (MERV) levels of 13 or higher.

Status: Chapter 777, Statutes of 2022

AB-2272 (Low) - Postsecondary education: California Educational Facilities Authority.

Authorizes the California Educational Facilities Authority (CEFA) to finance working capital loans to a participating independent (non-public) college and defines “working capital” for purposes of the CEFA Act.

Status: Chapter 123, Statutes of 2022

FOSTER AND HOMELESS YOUTH

SB-228 (Leyva) - Public postsecondary education: support services for foster youth: Cooperating Agencies Foster Youth Educational Support Program.

Expands eligibility for priority enrollment for current and former foster youth at the University of California, California State University, and California Community Colleges (CCC), and expands eligibility for a student support program for current and former foster youth at the CCCs. The contents of this bill were subsequently amended into SB 512 (Min).

Status: Senate-Died

SB-512 (Min) - Public postsecondary education: support services for foster youth: Cooperating Agencies Foster Youth Educational Support Program.

Expands eligibility for priority enrollment for current and former foster youth at the University of California, California State University, and CCC, and expands eligibility for a student support program for current and former foster youth at the CCCs. The contents of this bill were initially in SB 228 (Leyva).

Status: Chapter 574, Statutes of 2021

SB-622 (Roth) - Student financial aid: State Department of Social Services: individuals serving foster youth.

Requires the Department of Social Services to establish a program to provide tuition assistance to postgraduate students who are currently employed by, or who commit to seeking employment in, a county probation department serving foster youth and providing court-ordered placement services.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-885 (Laird) - Community colleges: Current and former foster youth support: NextUp.

Eliminates the existing cap on the number (20) of community college districts that may administer the Cooperating Agencies Foster Youth Educational Support Program, and

makes other changes to this program. The contents of this bill were ultimately included in AB 183 (Committee on Budget).

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

SB-1341 (Cortese) - Homeless pupils: California Success, Opportunity, and Academic Resilience (SOAR) Guaranteed Income Program.

Establishes the California Success, Opportunity, and Academic Resilience Guaranteed (SOAR) Income Program to provide monthly payments for four months to homeless pupils in grade 12.

Status: Assembly-Died - Higher Education

AB-1671 (Patterson) - California Ban on Scholarship Displacement for Foster Youth Act of 2022.

Establishes the California Ban on Scholarship Displacement for Foster Youth Act to prohibit public and private postsecondary educational institutions from reducing the institutional gift aid offer to a low-income current or former foster youth who received a private scholarship award.

Status: Assembly-Died

GOVERNANCE

SCA-5 (Glazer) - University of California: regents: student members.

Modifies the state Constitution to require, rather than authorize, members of the University of California (UC) Board of Regents to appoint two students enrolled at any UC campus to the UC Board of Regents, each serving a term of two years. The student members are to have full rights of participation on the Board of Regents.

Status: Assembly-Died - Appropriations

AB-337 (Medina) - Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges.

Converts the non-voting student member position to a voting student member position on the Board of Governors (BOG) of the California Community Colleges, thereby increasing the voting membership of the BOG from 17 to 18 members.

Status: Chapter 23, Statutes of 2021

AB-1290 (Lee) - Crimes: theft: animals.

When referred to this committee, the bill would have expanded the California Student Aid Commission to include two additional student members. Prior to being heard by this committee, the bill was amended to relate to the theft of animals.

Status: Chapter 546, Statutes of 2022

AB-1625 (Medina) - Trustees of the California State University: student members.

Authorizes a student who was appointed to the California State University Board of Trustees, whose term expires on June 30, to remain as a member of the Board of Trustees until either January 1 of the following year or until the Governor has appointed the student's replacement; whichever occurs first.

Status: Chapter 103, Statutes of 2022

AB-1736 (Choi) - Community colleges: student government.

Expands the eligibility pool of students who may serve as an elected officer in the student government of a California Community College to include students who are enrolled in an adult education program and students who are enrolled as a disabled student.

Status: Chapter 79, Statutes of 2022

AB-1936 (Ramos) - University of California: Hastings College of the Law.

Modifies provisions relative to the Hastings College of the Law by striking references throughout the Education Code of its founder, S.C. Hastings. This bill also re-designates Hastings College of the Law as the "College of the Law, San Francisco," and specifies a process for renaming the college.

Status: Chapter 478, Statutes of 2022

PRIVATE POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION

SB-802 (Roth) - Private postsecondary education.

Extends the sunset date for the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education (BPPE) until January 1, 2023, and makes additional technical changes, statutory improvements, and policy reforms in response to issues raised during the BPPE's sunset review oversight process.

Status: Chapter 552, Statutes of 2021

SB-851 (Portantino) - Cal Grant Program: independent institutions of higher education.

Modifies the formula for determining the amount of a Cal Grant award for a student who attends a California nonprofit independent institution of higher education (Independent California Colleges and Universities - ICCU). It further expands eligibility for supplemental Cal Grant programs and the Community College Entitlement program to students attending ICCUs. This bill was subsequently amended to relate to personal income tax and its contents, in part, were adopted in budget bill AB 183 (Committee on Budget, Chapter 54, Statutes of 2022).

Status: Chapter 705, Statutes of 2022

SB-1433 (Roth) - Private postsecondary education: California Private Postsecondary Education Act of 2009.

Extends the sunset date for the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education (Bureau or BPPE) and California Private Postsecondary Education Act of 2009 until January 1, 2027, and makes additional technical changes, statutory improvements, and policy reforms in response to issues raised during the BPPE's sunset review oversight process.

Status: Chapter 544, Statutes of 2022

AB-2341 (Medina) - California Private Postsecondary Education Act of 2009: out-of-state public institutions of higher education.

Authorizes a public institution of higher education established by a state other than California to apply to the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education for an approval to operate.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

PROGRAMS AND NEW CAMPUSES

SB-416 (Hueso) - Corrections: educational programs.

Requires the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to make college programs provided by the various California college systems or other regionally accredited, nonprofit colleges or universities in the state available to state prison inmates with a general educational development (GED) certificate or a high school diploma, establishes a set of criteria to be used to prioritize those college programs, and defines the responsibilities of those college education providers.

Status: Chapter 766, Statutes of 2021

SB-453 (Hurtado) - Agriculture: Biosecurity and Emerging Infectious Disease Fund.

Creates the Agricultural Biosecurity Fund, to be continuously appropriated to the California State University Agricultural Research Institute for purposes of establishing and administering a grant program for supporting research on biosecurity related to agriculture. This bill states that all research grants be awarded to campuses of the California State University associated with the California State University Agricultural Research Institute, including, but not limited to, California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo; California State Polytechnic University, Pomona; California State University, Chico; California State University, Fresno; California State University, Humboldt; and California State University, Monterey Bay.

Status: Chapter 386, Statutes of 2021

SB-547 (Glazer) - Animals: emergency response: California Veterinary Emergency Team program.

Requires the University of California, Davis School of Veterinary Medicine to develop a program to assist in coordinating and training a network of government agencies, nongovernmental organizations, and individuals to care for household and domestic animals and livestock during emergencies. The contents of the bill were subsequently included in the budget bill AB 132 (Committee on Budget, 2021).

Status: Assembly-Died - Higher Education

SB-787 (Hurtado) - California State University Program in Medical Education.

Requires the California State University to establish Doctor of Medicine degree programs with the goal of addressing access to medical care in underserved, disadvantaged areas. The bill appropriates \$25,000 from the General Fund to the trustees for the implementation and administration of the bill's provisions. The bill was not heard in this committee.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

SB-905 (Skinner) - Decarbonized Cement and Geologic Carbon Sequestration Demonstration Act.

Requires the California Air Resources Board to establish a Carbon Capture, Removal, Utilization, and Storage (CCRUS) Program and adopt regulations for a model unified permit program for the construction and operation of CCRUS projects.

Status: Chapter 359, Statutes of 2022

SB-964 (Wiener) - Behavioral health.

When heard by this committee, the bill would have required the California Community Colleges and the California State University, and requested the University of California, to develop two accelerated programs of study related to degrees in social work. This bill also included several provisions related to the behavioral health workforce including an analysis of scope of practice laws for behavioral health workers and licensure requirements, a stipend program, creation of an online jobs board, and a workforce analysis. The bill was subsequently amended to require the Department of Health Care Access and Information to commission consultants to prepare a report for the Legislature, on or before January 1, 2024, that provides a landscape analysis of the current behavioral health workforce and the state's behavioral health workforce needs, and to make recommendations on how to address the state's behavioral health workforce shortage.

Status: Senate-In Floor Process

SB-1199 (Roth) - University of California, Riverside, School of Medicine: teaching hospital.

Authorizes the University of California (UC) Regents, upon appropriation by the Legislature, to secure a teaching hospital in the County of Riverside to serve as an academic medical center for the purposes of training UC Riverside School of Medicine students.

Status: Assembly-Died - Higher Education

AB-39 (Chau) - California-China Climate Institute.

Authorizes the Regents of the University of California to establish the California-China Climate Institute in partnership with the Institute of Climate Change and Sustainable Development at Tsinghua University and other entities and institutions in China and California.

Status: Chapter 227, Statutes of 2021

AB-66 (Boerner Horvath) - Coastal resources: research: landslides and erosion: early warning system: County of San Diego.

Requires, upon appropriation by the Legislature, Scripps Institution of Oceanography at the University of California San Diego to conduct research on coastal cliff landslides and erosion in San Diego County as a condition of receiving the funds.

Status: Chapter 456, Statutes of 2021

AB-927 (Medina) - Public postsecondary education: community colleges: statewide baccalaureate degree program.

Removes the cap on the total number of baccalaureate degree programs allowed within the California Community College (CCC) system and eliminates the January 1, 2027, sunset date of the statewide baccalaureate degree pilot program, thereby permanently authorizing the offering of baccalaureate degree programs at CCCs.

Status: Chapter 565, Statutes of 2021

AB-1417 (Frazier) - Community colleges: providers of care for individuals with developmental disabilities: model curriculum for certification program.

Requires the California Community College Chancellor's Office to develop a model curriculum for a certification program for providers of care for individuals with developmental disabilities, designed to be offered at community college campuses where there is sufficient student interest and properly qualified faculty to sustain such a program. This bill was not heard by this committee.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-1432 (Low) - LGBTQ+ Pride Month.

Makes the California Online Community College Act inoperative at the end of the 2022-23 academic year, thereby eliminating Calbright Community College. This bill was subsequently amended to relate to LGBTQ Pride Month and was not heard by this committee.

Status: Chapter 947, Statutes of 2022

AB-1913 (Bryan) - Los Angeles Community College District: California Center for Climate Change Education.

Establishes the California Center for Climate Change Education , as part of the Los Angeles Community College District, for the purpose of promoting climate change education at the California Community Colleges and to establish hands-on learning opportunities for community college students. The contents of the bill were subsequently amended into budget bill AB 183 (Committee on Budget, Chapter 54, Statutes of 2022).

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2046 (Medina) - University of California: Inland Rising Fund.

Requires moneys appropriated by the Legislature in the annual Budget Act during the 2022-23 to 2024-25 fiscal years to directly support campus expansion projects and University of California (UC) climate initiatives at UC Riverside and UC Merced to supplement and not supplant any current or future funding.

Status: Chapter 526, Statutes of 2022

AB-2222 (Reyes) - Student financial aid: Golden State Social Opportunities Program.

Establishes, upon an appropriation by the Legislature in the Budget Act of 2022 or in any subsequent appropriation, the Golden State Social Opportunities student grant program to be administered by the Department of Health Care Access and Information.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-2425 (Bryan) - Community colleges: Hire UP: From Corrections to Career Pilot Program.

(1) Establishes the Hire UP: From Corrections to Career Pilot Program, to be administered by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office, to provide justice-involved individuals access to the credential programs and workforce support needed to enter, participate, and compete in California's economy; and (2) authorizes the Chancellor's Office to enter into agreements with up to 10 community college districts for a five-year pilot program to provide funding for stipends to formerly incarcerated individuals, CalWORKs recipients, and former foster youth. The contents of this bill were included in the 2022 Budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-2820 (Medina) - The California Online Community College.

Makes the California Online Community College Act inoperative on January 1, 2024; and, on or before January 1, 2024, appropriates the California Online Community College's funding for specified purposes at the California Community Colleges.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

REMEDIAL EDUCATION

AB-914 (Akilah Weber) - Public postsecondary education: California State University: proficiency level of entering students.

Modifies the requirements of an existing report the California State University (CSU) Chancellor's Office annually submits to the Legislature to include additional elements pertaining to freshmen student placement in CSU courses. It further changes the existing annual report deadline from February 1, to April 1, and eliminates an interim report currently due December 15 of each year.

Status: Chapter 564, Statutes of 2021

AB-1705 (Irwin) - Seymour-Campbell Student Success Act of 2012: matriculation: assessment.

Makes a number of changes and additions to existing law relative to the placement and enrollment of students into transfer-level English and Math courses at the California Community Colleges.

Status: Chapter 926, Statutes of 2022

STAFFING AND ADMINISTRATION

SB-205 (Leyva) - School and community college employees: absences due to illness or accident.

Repeals existing laws requiring public school and community college employees to pay for the cost of their substitutes while out on extended illness leave.

Status: Senate-Died

SB-379 (Wiener) - University of California: contracts: health facilities.

Prohibits the University of California (UC) from entering into a contract with a health facility contractor or subcontractor in which a UC-employed practitioner or trainee would be limited in their ability to provide patients with medical information or services due to nonclinical policy-based restrictions on care in the health facility. Additionally, this bill exempts from its provisions contracts between the UC and certain types of health facilities contractors and subcontractors. The bill was subsequently amended to relate to solar energy systems and energy storage.

Status: Chapter 356, Statutes of 2022

SB-566 (Leyva) - Public postsecondary education: California State University: support staff employees: merit salary adjustments.

Requires each support staff employee of the California State University to receive an annual five percent merit salary adjustment upon meeting the standards for satisfactory performance in their position.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-375 (Medina) - Community colleges: part-time employees.

Increases the maximum amount of instructional hours that a part-time community college faculty member may teach at any one community college district.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-1383 (Carrillo) - Community colleges: academic employees: involuntary administrative leave.

Specifies that a community college employer should complete its investigation of an employee's accused misconduct within 90 working days of placing the employee on involuntary paid administrative leave.

Status: Chapter 29, Statutes of 2021

AB-1856 (Medina) - Community colleges: part-time employees.

Increases the maximum amount of instructional hours that a part-time California Community College faculty member may teach at any one community college district.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-1963 (Salas) - California State University and University of California: gene synthesis providers.

Requires the California State University, and requests the University of California, to develop systemwide guidance for purchasing gene synthesis equipment or gene synthesis products from gene synthesis providers who prevent the misuse of synthetic genes and safeguard the benefits of gene synthesis technology while minimizing risk.

Status: Chapter 179, Statutes of 2022

AB-2046 (Medina) - University of California: Inland Rising Fund.

Requires moneys appropriated by the Legislature in the annual Budget Act during the 2022-23 to 2024-25 fiscal years to directly support campus expansion projects and University of California (UC) climate initiatives at UC Riverside and UC Merced to supplement and not supplant any current or future funding.

Status: Chapter 526, Statutes of 2022

AB-2286 (Irwin) - Student financial aid: Student Aid Commission: donations and philanthropic funds.

Authorizes the California Student Aid Commission to receive donations, bequests, grants, and philanthropic funding, subject to the conditions or restrictions that the Executive Director of the Commission may deem advisable, and subject to the approval of the Director of Finance.

Status: Chapter 187, Statutes of 2022

AB-2422 (McCarty) - California State University: investments.

Authorizes, commencing with the 2022-23 fiscal year, the California State University to invest in specified mutual funds, publicly-traded real estate investment trusts, institutional commingled funds, and exchange-traded funds. This bill limits the amount of total investments that may be invested in these funds to 65 percent of total investments.

Status: Chapter 530, Statutes of 2022

AB-2464 (Cristina Garcia) - California State University: employees: paid parental leave of absence.

Requires the California State University to provide employees with a paid leave of absence of one semester of an academic year, as specified, following the birth of a child of the employee or the placement of a child with an employee in connection with adoption or foster care placement.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

STUDENT BASIC NEEDS HOUSING AND HUNGER

SB-20 (Dodd) - Student nutrition: eligibility for CalFresh benefits.

Modifies the California Student Aid Commission notification and verification process for CalFresh food benefits for postsecondary students.

Status: Chapter 167, Statutes of 2022

SB-330 (Durazo) - Los Angeles Community College District Affordable Housing Pilot Program.

Requires the Los Angeles Community College District to develop and implement a pilot to provide affordable housing to its low-income students and low- to moderate-income employees. The bill requires LACCD to submit a report to the Legislature on the pilot by January 1, 2032.

Status: Chapter 572, Statutes of 2021

SB-1341 (Cortese) - Homeless pupils: California Success, Opportunity, and Academic Resilience (SOAR) Guaranteed Income Program.

Establishes the California Success, Opportunity, and Academic Resilience Guaranteed (SOAR) Income Program to provide monthly payments for four months to homeless pupils in grade 12.

Status: Assembly-Died - Higher Education

AB-396 (Gabriel) - CalFresh: educational programs.

(1) Requires the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) to issue guidance to the Chancellor's Offices of the California Community Colleges and the California State University, and the Office of the President of the University of California, to clarify certain information related to campus-based programs that may qualify a student for an exemption to the CalFresh student rule; (2) delineates certification application requirements for these institutions; and (3) requires CDSS to report certain data to the Legislature and post the report on its website regarding state-approved campus-based local educational programs that increase eligibility.

Status: Chapter 461, Statutes of 2021

AB-543 (Davies) - Public postsecondary education: student orientation: CalFresh.

Requires campuses of the California Community Colleges and the California State University Board of Trustees, and requests the University of California Board of Regents, to provide all incoming students with educational information regarding the CalFresh program, including the eligibility requirements, during campus orientation.

Status: Chapter 561, Statutes of 2021

AB-775 (Berman) - Contribution requirements: recurring contributions.

Requires each campus of the California Community Colleges to establish a Basic Needs Coordinator, a Basic Needs Center, and provide documentation of on – and off-campus basic needs resources for the purpose of providing basic needs services to students by specified dates. This bill was not heard by this committee; its contents were amended into budget bill AB 132 (Committee on Budget, Chapter 144, Statutes of 2021). The bill was subsequently amended to relate to elections.

Status: Chapter 942, Statutes of 2022

AB-1326 (Arambula) - Public social services: county liaison for higher education.

Requires a county human services agency to designate at least one employee as a staff liaison to serve as a contact for academic counselors and other professional staff at a campus of a postsecondary educational institution to provide information on programs and services that may be available to students. This bill also requires the California

State University and the California Community Colleges, and requests the University of California, to conduct a survey to determine the effectiveness of the county liaison position established by the bill.

Status: Chapter 570, Statutes of 2021

AB-1764 (Medina) - Public postsecondary education: student housing: survey.

Require the California State University and the California Community Colleges, and request the University of California, to collect data on student housing insecurity at each of their respective campuses and report to Legislature and the Legislative Analyst's Office. The provisions of this bill sunset January 1, 2028. This bill was absorbed into the 2022-23 budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-2459 (Cervantes) - Postsecondary education: student housing: data collection.

Requires the Office of the Chancellor of the California State University and the Office of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges, and requests the Office of the President of the University of California, to require each campus that provides student housing to post on its external and internal Internet websites specified information about the campus housing stock, the number of students requesting housing, and how many students are on waitlists.

Status: Chapter 593, Statutes of 2022

AB-2810 (Arambula) - Student nutrition: CalFresh: student eligibility: Federal Application for Student Aid data.

Requires each campus of the California State University and California Community College, and encourages the University of California and independent institutions of higher education, to identify and notify students of CalFresh eligibility through using their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) information.

Status: Chapter 934, Statutes of 2022

AB-2881 (Berman) - Public postsecondary education: students with dependent children.

(1) Requires each campus of the California State University and California Community Colleges, and requests each campus of the University of California, to provide priority enrollment to a student parent, and host a student parent webpage with on- and off-campus student parent services and resources; and (2) expands information that students are to receive to include information about the California Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), the California Earned Income Tax Credit, and the Young Child Tax Credit.

Status: Chapter 935, Statutes of 2022

STUDENT FEES / CAL GRANTS

SB-851 (Portantino) - Cal Grant Program: independent institutions of higher education.

Modifies the formula for determining the amount of a Cal Grant award for a student who attends a California nonprofit independent institution of higher education (Independent California Colleges and Universities - ICCU). It further expands eligibility for supplemental Cal Grant programs and the Community College Entitlement program to students attending ICCUs. This bill was subsequently amended to relate to personal income tax and its contents, in part, were adopted in budget bill AB 183 (Committee on Budget, Chapter 54, Statutes of 2022).

Status: Chapter 705, Statutes of 2022

SB-1141 (Limón) - Public postsecondary education: exemption from payment of nonresident tuition.

This bill expands eligibility for the exemption from paying nonresident tuition at a California public postsecondary institution established for long-term California residents, regardless of citizenship status, by removing the two-year cap on California Community College credit courses that may count towards eligibility.

Status: Chapter 490, Statutes of 2022

AB-1185 (Cervantes) - Student financial aid: Cal Grant program.

An urgency measure, provides students with an additional year to meet time-out-of-high-school and age-related eligibility requirements for receiving Cal Grant financial aid. This bill repeals specified provisions of this measure on January 1, 2024.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-1456 (Medina) - Student financial aid: Cal Grant Reform Act.

Enacts the Cal Grant Reform Act - making significant reforms to the state's financial aid Cal Grant Programs, including the phase-out of some existing programs and the creation of the new Cal Grant 2 Program for California Community Colleges students, and the Cal Grant 4 Program for students attending the University of California, California State University, and eligible private postsecondary institutions.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-1746 (Medina) - Student financial aid: Cal Grant Reform Act.

Makes significant reforms to the Cal Grant Program, the state's largest post-secondary financial aid program, including phasing-out existing programs and the creation of the new Cal Grant 2 Program for California Community College students and the Cal Grant

4 Program for students attending the University of California, California State University, and eligible private institutions. The contents of the bill were subsequently amended into budget bill AB 183 (Committee on Budget, Chapter 54, Statutes of 2022).

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

STUDENT FEES / FINANCIAL AID

SB-388 (Stern) - Platform companies: content management: negative externalities: report: acceptable use policy: illegal content.

(1) Establishes the CalServe Higher Education Grant Program, under the administration of the California Student Aid Commission, to award annual grants to eligible students to finance tuition and fees not covered by state, federal or institutional grants or waivers; (2) establishes a related fund in the State Treasury; and (3) reestablishes CaliforniaVolunteers, renamed CalServe, as a state agency and sets forth its mission, duties and responsibilities. This bill was not heard by this committee as it was amended to relate to social media platforms.

Status: Senate-Died - Judiciary

SB-436 (Dahle) - Community colleges: nonresident tuition.

Removes the sunset date of provisions in current law which authorize Lake Tahoe Community College to waive non-resident tuition fees and claim apportionment for a limited number of students that reside in the Nevada communities of the Lake Tahoe Basin, thereby making the authorization permanent.

Status: Chapter 573, Statutes of 2021

SB-622 (Roth) - Student financial aid: State Department of Social Services: individuals serving foster youth.

Requires the Department of Social Services to establish a program to provide tuition assistance to postgraduate students who are currently employed by, or who commit to seeking employment in, a county probation department serving foster youth and providing court-ordered placement services.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-659 (Becker) - Community colleges: California College Promise.

Authorizes a community college district to charge an enrollment fee that is lower than the amount established in statute to students who do not already benefit from existing fee waiver policies. The bill also allows a district to use California College Promise funds to assist students with their total cost of college attendance.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SB-737 (Limón) - California Student Opportunity and Access Program.

Modifies and expands criteria for which the California Student Aid Commission may apportion funds to support projects under the California Student Opportunity and Access program (Cal-SOAP). This bill additionally expands duties and responsibilities of funded projects.

Status: Chapter 575, Statutes of 2021

SB-893 (Becker) - Community colleges: San Mateo County Community College District: California College Promise.

Authorizes, until July 1, 2028, San Mateo County Community College District to use their unrestricted general funds to establish a tuition fee waiver and to provide financial assistance for the total cost of attendance for qualifying students, as defined.

Status: Chapter 937, Statutes of 2022

SB-1160 (Durazo) - Public postsecondary education: exemption from nonresident tuition.

Extends the exemption from paying non-resident tuition at California's public postsecondary institutions to nonresident international students.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

SJR-1 (Allen) - Student loan debt.

Requires the Secretary of the Senate to transmit copies of a resolution urging the President of the United States to forgive up to \$50,000 of student loan debt per student borrower to defined individuals.

Status: Chapter 147, Statutes of 2021

SJR-9 (Limón) - 20th anniversary of the nonresident tuition exemption: American Families Plan: immigration reform.

Recognizes October 12, 2021, as the 20th anniversary of the enactment of the exemption from nonresident tuition at California's public postsecondary universities established by AB 540 (Firebaugh, Chapter 814, Statutes of 2001) for qualified students. This resolution further calls upon the United States Congress to remove barriers to college access for undocumented students through the adoption of comprehensive immigration reform.

Status: Chapter 156, Statutes of 2022

AB-288 (Calderon) - California Ban on Scholarship Displacement Act of 2021.

Establishes the California Ban on Scholarship Displacement Act of 2021 and prohibits an institution of higher education from reducing offers of institutional gift aid of a student who is eligible to receive a Federal Pell Grant award or financial assistance under the

California Dream Act as a result of private scholarship awards designated for the student unless their gift aid exceeds the student's annual cost of attendance.

Status: Chapter 925, Statutes of 2022

AB-295 (Jones-Sawyer) - Public postsecondary education: pilot program for free cost of education: working group.

Requires the California Student Aid Commission to convene, until July 1, 2025, a working group to research and develop recommendations for the creation of a pilot program that would cover the cost of postsecondary education at a public postsecondary institution.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-340 (Ward) - Golden State Scholarshare Trust: Personal Income Tax Law: gross income: deductions.

Conforms the State's 529 college savings plan statute to recent changes in federal tax law that expand allowable withdrawals from 529 plans to include expenses associated with participation in a registered apprenticeship program and student loan repayment.

Status: Chapter 557, Statutes of 2021

AB-469 (Reyes) - Pupil instruction: financial aid applications.

Requires, on or before September 1, 2022, and each year thereafter, the California Student Aid Commission and the California Department of Education to facilitate the completion of the Free Application for Student Aid and the California Dream Act Application, through the sharing of specified data.

Status: Chapter 560, Statutes of 2021

AB-1113 (Medina) - Public postsecondary education: exemption from tuition and fees: qualifying survivors of persons providing medical or emergency services deceased during COVID-19 California state of emergency.

Exempts from mandatory systemwide or campus-based tuition or fees at the University of California, California State University, and California Community College any surviving spouse or child, of a licensed physician or a licensed nurse employed by a health facility regulated and licensed by the California Department of Public Health or as a first responder employed to provide emergency services who died of COVID.

Status: Chapter 569, Statutes of 2021

AB-1232 (McCarty) - Community colleges: nonresident tuition fees: English as a second language courses.

Adds an exemption for payment of nonresident tuition fee at a California Community College for certain nonresident students who enroll in a credit English as a second language course.

Status: Chapter 512, Statutes of 2022

AB-1671 (Patterson) - California Ban on Scholarship Displacement for Foster Youth Act of 2022.

Establishes the California Ban on Scholarship Displacement for Foster Youth Act to prohibit public and private postsecondary educational institutions from reducing the institutional gift aid offer to a low-income current or former foster youth who received a private scholarship award.

Status: Assembly-Died

AB-1958 (Mike Fong) - The Community College Student Access, Retention, and Debt Cancellation Program.

Establishes the Community College Student Access, Retention, and Debt Cancellation Program to provide fiscal incentives to encourage the enrollment and re-enrollment of students at the California Community Colleges.

Status: Chapter 929, Statutes of 2022

AB-1998 (Smith) - Community colleges: nonresident tuition fees: Western Undergraduate Exchange.

(1) Authorizes the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges to enter into the Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) through the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE); (2) allows small community college districts located near a bordering state to charge a lower tuition rate to out-of-state students from WUE participating states; and (3) decreases the per-unit fee for eligible resident students from three, to one and one-half, times the amount established for resident students.

Status: Chapter 495, Statutes of 2022

AB-2004 (Cristina Garcia) - California DREAM Loan Program.

Establishes additional requirements for a campus of the California State University or the University of California that participate in the DREAM Loan program and sets borrowing limits. The bill further requires a participating institution, on or before January 1, 2024, to establish DREAM loan forgiveness options for borrowers with similar standards as those set for the Federal Perkins Loan Program.

Status: Chapter 484, Statutes of 2022

AB-2069 (Villapudua) - California Home Health Aide Training Scholarship Act.

Establishes the California Home Health Aide Training Scholarship Act to be administered by the Department of Health Care Access and Information to incentivize enrollment in home health aide training programs by awarding \$1,500 scholarships.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-2222 (Reyes) - Student financial aid: Golden State Social Opportunities Program.

Establishes, upon an appropriation by the Legislature in the Budget Act of 2022 or in any subsequent appropriation, the Golden State Social Opportunities student grant program to be administered by the Department of Health Care Access and Information.

Status: Assembly-Vetoed

AB-2747 (Nazarian) - Public postsecondary education: tuition and fees: Team USA student athletes.

Authorizes the United States Olympic and Paralympic Committee (USOPC) to bestow a Team USA student athlete, who trains in the state in an elite level program approved by USOPC, with resident classification for the purpose of determining tuition and fees.

Status: Chapter 972, Statutes of 2022

AJR-26 (Medina) - Student loan debt repayment.

Requires the Chief Clerk of the Assembly to transmit to specified individuals, copies of a resolution urging the United States Secretary of Education to establish and submit to the United States Congress for approval of a monthly student loan payment plan based on the monthly personal savings rate as published by the federal Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Status: Chapter 174, Statutes of 2022

AJR-33 (Santiago) - Federal student debt: cancellation.

Urges, on behalf of the Assembly and the Senate of the State of California, the Biden Administration to cancel all federal student loan debt and requires the Chief Clerk of the Assembly to transmit copies of the resolution to the President, Vice President, and the United States Secretary of Education.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

STUDENT SAFETY AND HEALTH

SB-367 (Hurtado) - Student safety: opioid overdose reversal medication.

Requires California Community Colleges and the California State University, and requests the University of California, to utilize a statewide program to distribute dosages

of a federally approved opioid overdose reversal medication, and provide educational and preventive information about opioid overdose and reversal medication as part of established campus orientations.

Status: Chapter 218, Statutes of 2022

AB-367 (Cristina Garcia) - Menstrual products.

The Menstrual Equity for All Act of 2021, (1) requires, beginning with the 2022-23 school year, all public schools maintaining any combination of classes from grades 6 to 12, inclusive, to stock the school's restrooms at all times with an adequate supply of menstrual products in all women's restrooms and all-gender restrooms, and in at least one men's restroom; and (2) requires the California State University and each community college district, and encourages the University of California, independent institutions of higher education, and private postsecondary educational institutions, to stock an adequate supply of menstrual products at no fewer than one designated and accessible central location on each campus.

Status: Chapter 664, Statutes of 2021

AB-524 (Rodriguez) - Postsecondary education: Campus-Recognized Sorority and Fraternity Transparency Act.

Requires, beginning October 1, 2023, an institution of higher education to collect and post on its campus website and annually email to all enrolled students a report containing certain information about its campus-recognized sororities and fraternities.

Status: Chapter 268, Statutes of 2022

AB-1467 (Cervantes) - Student safety: sexual assault procedures and protocols: sexual assault counselors.

Requires sexual assault and domestic violence counselors at public colleges and universities to be independent from the Title IX office, prohibits sexual assault and domestic violence counselors from releasing the identity of the victim without first obtaining specific permission, and authorizes the California State University chancellor to collaborate with specified entities when reviewing executive orders related to discrimination, harassment, and retaliation.

Status: Chapter 556, Statutes of 2022

AB-1712 (Medina) - Public postsecondary education: campus safety: online survey tool.

Requires the Office of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges and Office of the Chancellor of the California State University, and requests the Office of the President of the University of California, to: (1) develop questions to determine student perspectives on campus climate for the purpose of being included in the new federal online survey tool for campus safety used by California's postsecondary education

institutions; and, (2) submit a report on the published campus-level results from the online survey biennially.

Status: Chapter 928, Statutes of 2022

AB-1968 (Seyarto) - Public postsecondary education: uniform informational guidance for sexual assault survivors.

Requires the California State University and requests the University of California to develop content and presentation standards and a model internet website template regarding the steps a student who is a victim of sexual assault may take immediately following the assault.

Status: Chapter 115, Statutes of 2022

AB-1997 (Gipson) - California State University: emergency response programs: report.

Requires the Chancellor of the California State University (CSU) to convene a stakeholder workgroup for the purpose of making recommendations to alleviate concerns of current emergency response programs on CSU campuses.

Status: Chapter 931, Statutes of 2022

AB-2122 (Choi) - Public postsecondary education: mental health hotlines: student identification cards.

Requires each campus of a California State University and the California Community Colleges, and request each campus of the University of California, with a campus mental health hotline to have printed on either side of student identification cards the telephone number of their mental health hotline or the city's or county's mental health hotline, for which the campus is located, if the campus does not have a campus mental health hotline.

Status: Chapter 183, Statutes of 2022

AB-2482 (Calderon) - Public postsecondary education: student health: pilot program: wellness vending machines.

Requires the California State University and California Community Colleges to select five campuses within each respective segment to participate in the Wellness Vending Machine Pilot Program for the purpose of maintaining wellness vending machines that dispense specified non-prescription wellness products.

Status: Chapter 933, Statutes of 2022

AB-2683 (Gabriel) - Postsecondary education: sexual violence and harassment: training and resources.

Requires the California Community Colleges, the California State University, and any independent institution of higher education or private postsecondary education

institutions that receives state financial assistance, and requests the University of California, to provide annual sexual harassment and sexual violence prevention training to students.

Status: Chapter 798, Statutes of 2022

TECHNOLOGY AND DATA

AB-469 (Reyes) - Pupil instruction: financial aid applications.

Requires, on or before September 1, 2022, and each year thereafter, the California Student Aid Commission and the California Department of Education to facilitate the completion of the Free Application for Student Aid and the California Dream Act Application, through the sharing of specified data.

Status: Chapter 560, Statutes of 2021

AB-524 (Rodriguez) - Postsecondary education: Campus-Recognized Sorority and Fraternity Transparency Act.

Requires, beginning October 1, 2023, an institution of higher education to collect and post on its campus website and annually email to all enrolled students a report containing certain information about its campus-recognized sororities and fraternities.

Status: Chapter 268, Statutes of 2022

AB-1111 (Berman) - Postsecondary education: common course numbering system.

Requires, by July 1, 2024, the California Community Colleges to adopt a common course numbering system. This bill provides that the common course numbering system shall be student facing and ensure that comparable courses across all community colleges have the same course number.

Status: Chapter 568, Statutes of 2021

AB-2627 (Bauer-Kahan) - Electronically collected personal information: local agencies: the California Community Colleges: memorandum of understanding.

Authorizes a local agency, at the request of the governing board of a California Community College (CCC) district, to enter into a memorandum of understanding that would allow the agency and the CCC district to share electronically collected personal information about users for the purpose of facilitating outreach to, and enrollment of, individuals in the CCC system and notifying the user of all available support resources.

Status: Chapter 333, Statutes of 2022

VETERAN AND MILITARY PERSONNEL

AB-576 (Maienschein) - Community colleges: apportionments: waiver of open course provisions: military personnel.

Authorizes community college districts to collect per-student apportionment funding for courses taught on military bases, except under certain circumstances.

Status: Chapter 562, Statutes of 2021

AB-1002 (Choi) - Postsecondary education: course credit for prior military education, training, and service.

Requires the California State University (CSU) Chancellor's Office, in collaboration with the CSU Academic Senate, and requests the University of California, by September 1, 2022, to develop a consistent policy for awarding course credit for prior military education, training, and service, as specified.

Status: Chapter 567, Statutes of 2021

AB-1633 (Seyarto) - Public postsecondary education: veterans' educational benefits: information sharing.

Commencing with the 2023-24 academic year, and annually thereafter, requires the California State University and requests the University of California to, electronically transmit to the Department of Veterans Affairs (CalVet), personal information regarding each student whose tuition or fees, or both are paid, or intended to be paid, using GI Bill educational benefits, if the student has provided informed written consent to the disclosure.

Status: Chapter 174, Statutes of 2022

AB-1731 (Davies) - Postsecondary education: Title 38 awards: postsecondary educational institutions: application for approval or renewal.

Requires the California State Approving Agency for Veterans Education (CSAAVE) to establish regulations that require postsecondary education institutions desiring to enroll students for federal Title 38 awards to provide information to CSAAVE as part of an application for approval or renewal of its courses for Title 38 award eligibility.

Status: Chapter 380, Statutes of 2022

OTHER LEGISLATION

SB-26 (Skinner) - Collegiate athletics: student athlete compensation and representation.

Expands the existing authority for a collegiate student athlete to receive compensation to also include compensation earned from the use of the student's athletic reputation,

and moves up the implementation date of existing statutes relative to compensation earned from the use of a student athlete's name, image, or likeness.

Status: Chapter 159, Statutes of 2021

SB-701 (Committee on Education) - Public postsecondary education: federal GI Bill: nonresident tuition: real property.

Corrects technical errors and oversights, and makes numerous non-controversial and conforming changes to various provisions of the Education Code.

Status: Chapter 110, Statutes of 2021

SB-1401 (Bradford) - College Athlete Race and Gender Equity Act.

Requires postsecondary institutions to establish degree completion funds for their student athletes that take into account the revenues generated by the sport in question and the amount of athletic scholarship aid provided to athletes participating in that sport.

Status: Senate-Died - Appropriations

AB-245 (Chiu) - Educational equity: student records: name and gender changes.

(1) Requires the University of California (UC), the California State University (CSU), and California Community Colleges (CCC) to provide an option for a graduating student to request that the diploma list the student's chosen name (rather than legal name); and (2) requires the UC, CSU, and CCCs, upon request, to update the former student's records to include the updated legal name or gender and reissue any documents conferred upon the former student with the former student's updated legal name or gender.

Status: Chapter 555, Statutes of 2021

AB-1040 (Muratsuchi) - Community colleges: ethnic studies.

Requires each community college district to: (1) commencing with the 2022–23 academic year, offer courses in ethnic studies at each of its campuses; and (2) commencing with the 2024–25 academic year, require the completion of at least one course in ethnic studies of at least three units as a requirement for a student to obtain an associate degree, and requires the Legislative Analyst's Office to conduct a study on the number of ethnic studies courses the California State University accepted from the community college districts to satisfy the ethnic studies course graduation requirement.

Status: Senate-Died - Education

AB-1655 (Jones-Sawyer) - State holidays: Juneteenth.

(1) Establishes June 19, known as "Juneteenth," as a state holiday; (2) requires public schools serving any of grades K-12 and community colleges to close on June 19 to observe Juneteenth; (3) and authorizes state employees to elect to take time off with pay in recognition of Juneteenth.

Status: Chapter 753, Statutes of 2022

AB-1801 (Nazarian) - State holidays: Genocide Remembrance Day.

Adds April 24, known as “Genocide Remembrance Day,” to the list of state holidays. Additionally, this bill authorizes state employees to elect to take time off with pay in recognition of “Genocide Remembrance Day,” as specified, and authorizes community colleges and public schools to close on April 24, known as “Genocide Remembrance Day, as specified.

Status: Chapter 761, Statutes of 2022

AB-2150 (Lackey) - Cannabis research.

Requires the Center for Medicinal Cannabis Research, if the Regents of the University of California accept by appropriate resolution, to establish a study examining the effects of cannabis products that are currently in the commercial cannabis market, and appropriates \$2 million for this purpose. The contents of this bill were included in the 2021 Budget.

Status: Senate-Died - Business, Professions and Economic Development

AB-2315 (Arambula) - Community colleges: records: affirmed name and gender identification.

Requires community colleges to implement a process whereby current students, staff, and faculty may request the updating of any records for that person to include the person’s affirmed name, gender, or both name and gender identification.

Status: Chapter 932, Statutes of 2022

AB-2973 (Committee on Higher Education) - Postsecondary education: omnibus bill.

Makes non-controversial, technical and conforming changes to various provisions of the Education Code.

Status: Chapter 465, Statutes of 2022

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
